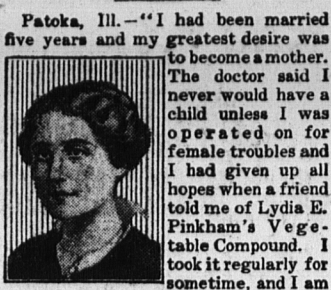


Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any state over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.
Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.
In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$5.00 per acre.
Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.
A settler who purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

Mrs. J. O. Hyndman— I must apologise for not writing you and thanking you and through you the women of Prince Edward Island for the splendid lot of socks you sent to my battery. They arrived the day of the big battle and as it rained that night and we were on the move the socks came in very handy. They have been in fact regular life savers and I wish I could convey to you and those who sent them all we feel for your kindness and thoughtfulness. The life of a Field Artillery man has many hardships as well as excitements but wet feet I think is one of the most uncomfortable things we have to put up with. Your socks have fixed us up O.K. and now the fine weather is coming, we can be as cheerful as the birds. I have only two or three sick boys at present and they are not very ill, so we are very fortunate. We came through the big battle in great trim and have been working like niggers ever since trying to keep up with our infantry. They are peaches and we are very proud of them and they of us as we gave them such an elegant barrage that the hum couldn't get in his fine work and our losses were consequently small. Lately we have been in some hot spots but the present one has everything trimmed. However we expect the pressure will let up in a day and we will be adding new territory. Its great excitement and stirring scenes meet the eye and claim the attention all the time. I am beginning to get hardened to the "sights" but it makes me feel very badly to see our poor chaps who have been unfortunate. I hope this year will see us at next winter I will be down on the ice with Angus Dillard and have the pleasure of exhibiting his speed to you and all the other dear people of Charlottetown and vicinity.
Adolph is my batman and takes great care of me and I of him so we are both very fortunate. I have quite a lot of P. E. Island boys in my battery and they are all that one could wish. My battery was recently enlarged and that brought in about twenty more P. E. Is. from another battery. My hope is that I will be able to take them home to their parents sound and well and none the worse for their experience in the great war. I must close now Mrs. Hyndman with the hope that you will please let the givers of those lovely warm socks know how much we appreciate their kindness and how a gift like that from home brightens up one when perhaps a little bit depressed. MIRACULOUS ESCAPE AT THE FIRING LINE

The following letter has been received by Miss Sarah H. McLeod, Valleyfield, from her brother, Private George P. McLeod, attached to the 10th Battalion, France.

Dear Sister,— I am just writing you a few lines; this time from a hospital,— but I am still on top, and very much alive! So you do not need to worry.

I got into a rather tight place a few days ago; and I came out second best. I am in the hospital with contusion of the back, due to a shell bursting right behind me.

However, I got off very lucky. On arriving at the dressing station, it was found that a piece of shrapnel had torn through my equipment, cut the leather on my braces, at the back, tore the buttons off the back of my trousers; cut through my top shirt, but did not cut my undershirt or skin.

Another piece tore through my gas protector, and a dum-dum bullet went through my water bottle, also a small piece of shrapnel cut a cute little piece of meat off one of my fingers, and my bayonet was broken off close to the muzzle of my rifle. So under the circumstances I consider myself pretty lucky.

My back is much better today. So I expect to be able to join the fighting Tenth shortly. You may have a letter from a friend of mine, H. Barnes. I gave him your address, before we went in, and he gave me the address of his folks. It was just a precaution I took in case something did happen. I have not seen him since. So on him hearing I got out he might think I could not write myself. So if you hear from him be sure and answer right away. Well, sister, I will be waiting for a parcel to straighten up on, and as I've got a few more short notes to write, I will come to a close for this time.
