Three-Bureau Shift Of C.P. Bureau Chiefs

HALIFAX, Oct. 4—(CP)—A three-way shift of Canadian Press bureau chiefs was announced at today's board meeting of the national news-gathering co-operative by general manager Gillis Purcell.

John Dauphinee, present head of CP's New York bureau, moves to Winnipeg as bureau chief with supervisory duties for Western Canada. Dauphinee, 36, a native of Vancouver, has been with CP since 1938. He was London chief 1945-48.

E. S. Johnson, chief of bureau at Winnipeg, goes to London, where he served previously from 1937 to 1940. Johnson, 52, is a veteran in the service, having joined CP in 1924 and served at Winnipeg, Ottawa, Toronto, New York and London.

Stuart Underhill, London chief, replaces Dauphinee in New York. Underhill, a 38-year-old Scot, joined CP in Vancouver in 1937. Maritime Synod To Meet In Halifax

HALIFAX, Oct. 4—(CP)—The Synod of the Maritime Provinces of the Presbyterian Church in Canada will meet here Oct. 4-6. For the first time, the synod will include Newfoundland in its sessions as a Province of Canada. Four of the hundred delegates expected will be from the new province.

Rev. A. Morrison of New Glasgow, N.S., Moderator, will convene opening sessions. His successor will be elected Tuesday.

Dr. Frank Baird of Fredericton, who has been synod clerk for nearly 30 years, probably will be succeeded by the assistant clerk, Dr. A. D. MacKinnon of Little Narrows, N. S.

Scheduled for tabling are resolutions dealing with temperance, Nova Scotia's exciting liquor legislation and proposals to name a Canadian Ambassador to the Vatican.

Chief Guide Commissioner To Visit Province

A meeting of the Executive of the Provincial Girl Guides Association was held at the home of the Provincial Commissioner, Mrs. J. Gordon MacDonald, Saturday afternoon, when plans were made regarding the visit to the province of the Chief Commissioner for the Dominion of Canada—Mrs. D. E. S. Wishart, who is scheduled to be here October 18th, 19th and 20th. There was a very full attendance of the Executive members, and the Provincial Commissioner, Mrs. MacDonald, presided.

Miss Suzanne MacKinnon, Provincial Camp Adviser, reported a most successful camp had been held at North Rustico in August at which there were 89 Guides and a staff of 13 in attendance. This was the first Provincial Girl Guide Camp held on the Island, as formerly there were either County or Company Camps. Two Guides from the Camp as well as a Girl Scout from the United States. Two of our Guides—Misses Norma Jean Allen and Maureen Bohaker of the 7th Charlottetown Company—attended the New Brunswick Camp at Lake Utopia as an exchange.

Mrs. MacDonald outlined the suggested plans for Mrs. Wishart's visit, and after a general discussion the following program was agreed upon: Tuesday, October 18th—Mrs. Wishart to arrive by plane at Summerside Airport where she will be greeted by Provincial Officers, and presented with an illuminated itinerary of her Prince Edward Island visit by a Girl Guide and Brownie from Summerside. Wednesday, October 19th—Semi-Annual Meeting of Provincial Girl Guide Association to be held at Government House at 3 p.m. All members of the Provincial Executive, Local Associations, Guiders, as well as others interested in Guiding are cordially invited to attend this meeting at which the guest speaker will be Mrs. Wishart, Chief Commissioner. Reports will also be given by Mrs. J. C. MacDonald, Provincial Commissioner, on the Dominion Annual Meeting held in Toronto, and by Miss Lillian Duchemin, Public Relations Commissioner, on the meeting of Maritime Commissioners held in Moncton. At the conclusion of the meeting tea will be served to all present by the Provincial Executive.

8 p.m.—Mrs. Wishart will meet with the Commissioners and Heads of Committees at the home of Mrs. J. G. MacDonald. Thursday, October 20th—Mrs. Wishart and members of the Provincial Executive will go to Moncton where, at 9:30 p.m., the Chief Commissioner will inspect the King's County Brownies and Guides at the School, after which she will be entertained at a dinner by Mrs. L. H. Poole, Division Commissioner, when members of the Local Associations of King's County will have an opportunity of meeting Mrs. Wishart.

6 p.m.—All Queen's County Brownies and Guides will assemble at the Y. M. C. A. for a Campfire and inspection by the Chief Commissioner. Further details regarding this function will appear later in the press when plans are finalized.

8:15 p.m.—The Chief Commissioner will meet with the Queen's County Guiders. This will be the final gathering during Mrs. Wishart's visit as she will leave on return by plane Friday morning, October 21st.

Mrs. D. C. Tompkins, District Commissioner, reported that their Guiders and Local Association members are now having joint meetings and find them most satisfactory.
