

St. Davids Church, Georgetown

In 1837, the year Queen Victoria began her reign, there was prepared in Charlottetown a document, which reads in part as follows: "Know ye, that I, Sir Charles Augustus Fynes, Lieutenant-Governor, and Commander in Chief in and over Her Majesty's Island, Prince Edward, and its dependencies, do give, grant, license, and unto the Reverend Roderick Macaulay, minister of the Presbyterian Church in Georgetown, William Mackay of Georgetown, Elder of said Church, George Aitken senior, of the same place Elder of said Church, and to their successors in office forever, those pieces or parcels of ground in Georgetown known as town lots numbers eleven and twelve, as a site for a Church, in connection with and governed by and according to the rules regulations and disciplines of the Kirk of Scotland as established by law."

A few years after the purchase of the site a small building was erected, but apparently not paid for, as in a Charlottetown paper in 1858 this notice appeared: "The ladies of St. David's Church in Georgetown will hold a Soliree to raise money to pay off the debt incurred by the Trustees. Tickets one shilling and sixpence." The original building was almost square, with high pulpit, with a high and long pole with pouch for receiving the collection attached, and before the altar a wooden bench with singing. About the beginning of this century, the building was enlarged and new seats provided. The manse arose to the church in the early sixties and was modeled after the house on Prince Street in Charlottetown, owned by...

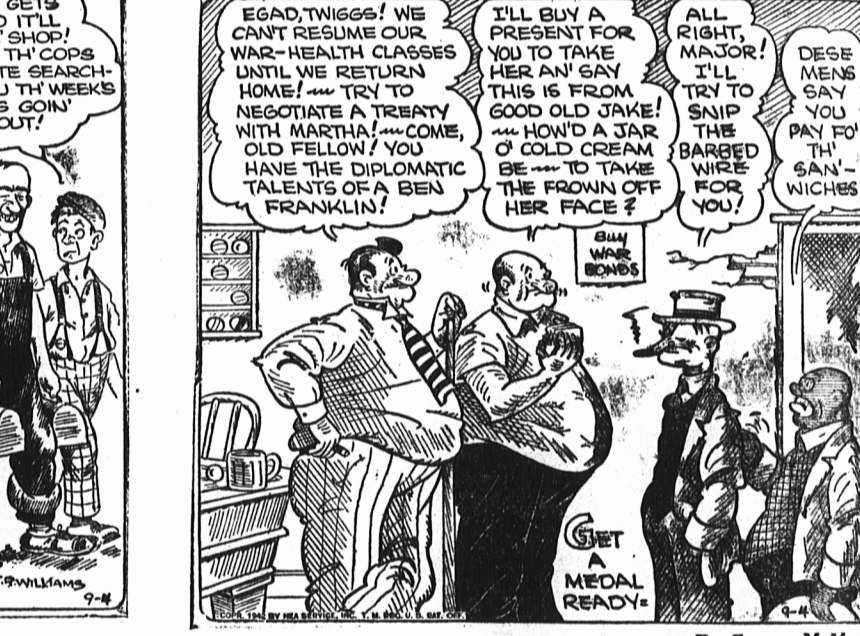
360th R.C.A.F. Casualty List

- OTTAWA, Sept. 3.—(CP)—The Royal Canadian Air Force in its 360th casualty list of the war to date announced that eight men were killed on active service overseas. Seventeen men were listed as missing after operations, two as seriously injured on active service and one as seriously ill, all overseas. The list also named four men as missing believed killed during air operations overseas. The overseas section also included one man died as result of injuries on active service, one drowned accidentally and one previously reported missing believed killed, now reported killed on active service. The "Canada" section of the list included one man drowned accidentally, one missing after operations on active service, two seriously injured in automobile accidents and one seriously ill.
