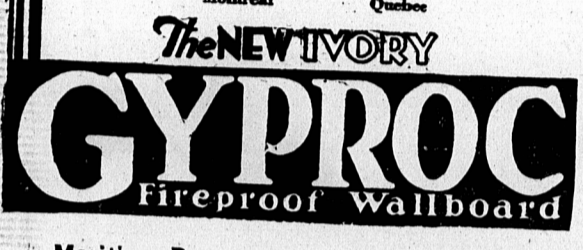

### VAST WEALTH IN CANADA'S FORESTS

The growth of Canada's forest industry by generations shows a tremendous advance in value. It rose from \$967,000,000 in 1911-20 to \$2,645,000,000 for the period 1921-30. The value for the previous thirty-year period, 1901-10, was \$431,000,000. This emphasizes the importance of Maritimes as deeply interested in view of the large forest areas in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. The forests of Canada are in aggregate the second most important of the forest protection. In this respect the natural resources, being exceeded in actual value only by agriculture. According to the latest figures available, New Brunswick has a total forest area of 24,860 square miles; Nova Scotia, 15,220 square miles. Prince Edward Island has no extensive forest areas. In 1930, Canada produced 98% of the world's production of newsprint paper. The tonnage was practically double that turned out in the United States, the nearest competitor with 18%. Great Britain and Germany each manufactured about 9% and Newfoundland and Japan 4% each. The six countries enumerated accounted for about four-fifths of the world's supply of newsprint which aggregated 6,975,000 tons in 1930. Canada's total production was 2,504,000 tons. In the export field, Canada supplied 64% or 2,331,000 tons. The United States took 76%, Great Britain 12%, France 5%.

### NEW WAR TERROR

PARIS, May 18. (British United Press)—A super-rocket, capable of bringing destruction to a city hundreds of miles away, is the result of many years of research on the part of French chemists. Its inventors claim that it can hit with accuracy a mark several hundreds of miles distant.

This giant projectile, it is stated, is terrifically destructive. It has the advantage over guns and shells in that it is far cheaper and can be moved about with greater ease.

The rocket is cigar-shaped and about 30 feet long with spiral fins to make it rotate like a rifle bullet. With the aid of aeroplane observation the firing can be adjusted like that of ordinary artillery to hit small targets.

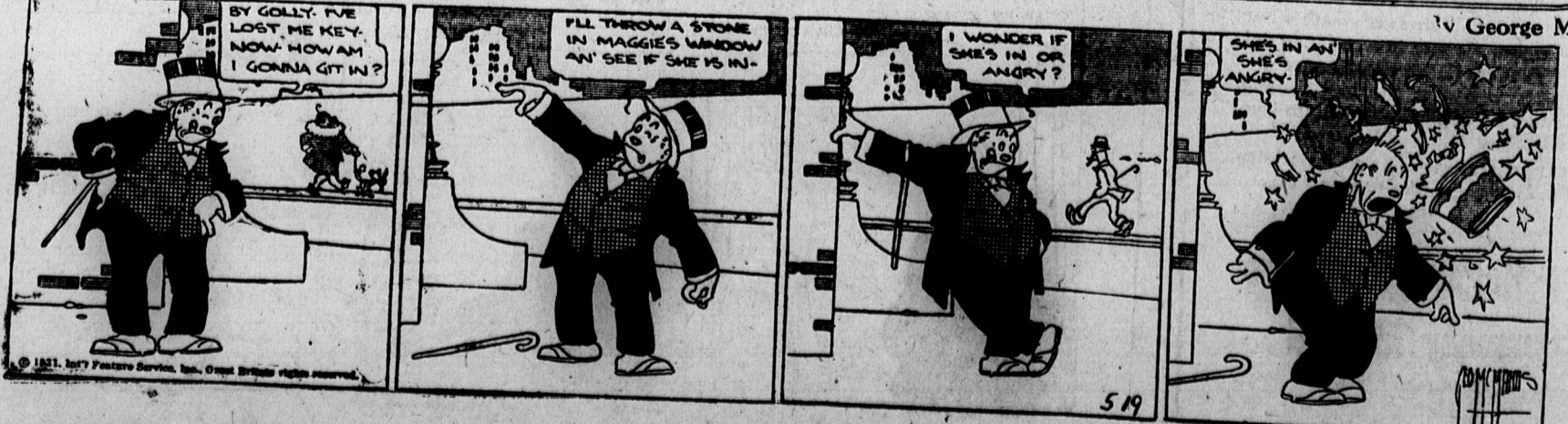
### CAT CAUSES COURT SUIT
