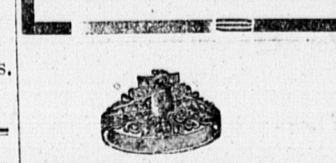

MEETING OF P. E. I. STOCK BRE

Held in the Exhibition Lecture Room During the Exhibition.—Large Number Present.

A meeting of the P. E. I. Stock Breeders Association was held in the lecture room on the exhibition grounds on Sept. 23, a large number of stock men were present and were presided over by Pres. P. S. Brown, who, in a very appropriate address, opened the meeting and introduced Dr. G. Reid and J. Davidson, who judged the horses and dairy cattle respectively.

In the course of his address Dr. Reid spoke of the advantages of a Stock Breeders Association and urged the farmers to breed such horses as meet a ready sale and were in demand, and not to sell the better class of filies too readily but to use them for breeding purposes with the view of further improving our stock. Speaking of the resources the doctor said they were almost entirely agricultural and the basis of success in farming in this province is live stock and that it had splendid opportunities in both soil and climate for the production of the very highest class of all kinds of live stock. The Doctor then cited how only a few years ago, Ontario was face to face with bankruptcy from exporting grain, while today she is one of the richest countries in the world, the change brought about by live stock. Dr. Reid urged all to use only pure

bred sires of the best quality of the breed selected.

Mr. Davidson, who followed with an excellent address on dairying, said an average cow gave only 3000 lbs. of milk, whereas it required at least 4000 lbs. to be profitable. The method to adopt to improve the dairy herds is to breed along the best dairy lines and for the heaviest production. This can only be done by careful selection by weighing and testing each cow's milk individually. The speaker strongly urged farmers to use only dairy breeds for the production of milk using a bull of one of the dairy breeds from heavy producing ancestry.

Too great stress cannot be placed upon feeding the dairy cow as she requires two thirds of all her food to maintain her body, leaving only one third for the production of milk.

Mr. Davidson also thought farmers should take a more active interest in the management of the exhibitions and endeavor to make them more successful. An invitation was received for delegates to attend the seed fair at Summerside and to hold a meeting at that time.

After a hearty vote of thanks being tendered to Dr. Reid and Mr. Davidson the meeting adjourned to meet at the call of the officers.

THE BAPTIST CONFERENCE

Held in the Baptist Church Cavendish, Rev. J. W. Porter Present.

The sixteen session of the P. E. I. Baptist Conference met with the Baptist Church at Cavendish on Sept. 23 and 24th. It was a great pleasure to several of the delegates who had never before visited this beautiful section of the country to look out over its sand-hills and vast expanse of old ocean. It was found that the church was without a pastor. G. F. Camp, student-pastor, who had spent the vacation months having just returned to his studies. His work on the field was highly appreciated and very successful. The people entertained the delegates with great kindness and cheerfully drove us from and to the Railway Station, for which a hearty vote of thanks was tendered them.

The attendance of pastors was regrettably small, their being only three pastors and one of the student pastors, who was on the way to College, present. Why cannot all the pastors arrange their plans so that they can attend the Quarterly Conference. Brothers, begin now to plan for the next meeting in Belfast on Dec. 14th. It was both instructive and inspiring to have Rev. J. W. Porter, Supt. of the Baptist Home Mission for N. S. & P. E. I., who gave an interesting address on the Home Mission Work, besides taking a very helpful part in all the deliberations. Other addresses were given by Rev. W. B. Crowell, on "The Island's Home Mission Needs," and by J. Artemas Clark, on "Methods of Conducting and Managing a Sunday School." Helpful devotional services were conducted by Rev. G. R. White, J. M. Shortliffe, Lic., and Bruce Davidson. The Women's Mission Aid Society held a meeting at which interesting papers were read by Rev. W. B. Crowell on "The Front Line and How to Move Up To It." Miss Irene Clark gave a report of the Mission Bands of the Province; Miss McNeill of the Cavendish Society gave a review of their Society since its organization thirty eight years ago. At the closing service Rev. G. R. White preached an inspiring sermon, after which Rev. W. B. Crowell conducted an after-meeting of much profit. Offerings for denominational work amounted to \$12.55.

Resolutions were passed recommending that the Home Mission Board make certain grants to the Alberton

and St. Peter's Road Churches. Resolutions were also passed expressing appreciation of the young men who had supplied the mission field during vacation, conveying thanks to the Cavendish friends for kindness to delegates, to the Supt. of the P. E. I. Railway for reduced rate of travel; expressing sympathy with Rev. G. H. Beaman, whose ill health has obliged him to resign the pastorate of the East Point churches.

The following resolutions were also unanimously passed— (1) Whereas a Council of Social and Political Reform for the prevention of social and political abuses has been organized in this Province. Therefore resolved, that this Baptist Conference of P. E. I. express its hearty sympathy and interest in its objects and aims. (2) Resolved that the delegates to the Baptist Conference now assembled, desire to place on record our strong appreciation to all forms of correct practice in political contests, and would urge upon all our pastors to preach sermons on Political Purity, and would also urge upon our entire Baptist constituency to do all in their power to prevent these practices in the forthcoming elections. (3) Resolved that we express our strongest disapproval of the exercise of Executive authority by which persons imprisoned for violating the Prohibitory Law are released from prison.
