Immigrants Must Have \$250 Coming To Canada

OTTAWA, March 21.—An order in council just passed by the Canadian Government extends indefinitely the provisions of an order passed last November whereby immigrants of mechanic artisan or laborer skilled or unskilled are required to be in possession of \$250 on landing in Canada, in addition to a ticket without taking any other money.
