BIG POTATO SHIPMENT.—The cargo steamer sailed from Charlottetown at 6.30 yesterday morning, with over nine hundred tons of potatoes bound for various points in Canada. The steamer docked in Picton at 10 a. m. and will load a large cargo there before returning to this city. There are still about thirty-eight carloads awaiting shipment, owing to the cold weather the management at Moncton has wired the railway department here not to receive any more as they have not the means of protecting them from frost on the Mainland. It is understood that some were injured by frost during the sudden cold spell, but the damage is not as great as might have been expected.

PRINCE EDWARD THEATRE.—A photo-play that will stir the heart of every person with Scotch blood or any Englishman is being shown at the Prince Edward Theatre today. McDonald, the Secretary, and each gave a short address which was well received by those present. The meeting was then thrown open to a general discussion. Colin T. Wright, Hugh Gillis, and Colin Craig expressed their sentiments as regarded the movement, and told of the saving they were making as applied to groceries, and farm machinery. A number of members having joined, it was decided that a Committee be appointed to continue the work. The following were then elected to have charge until the 15th of Feb., 1917: Chairman, Ambrose Monteith; Secretary, Colin Craig; also Colin T. Wright, Arthur Craig and Michael McKenna. A vote of thanks being tendered the Chairman of the meeting Mr. McKenna, the meeting adjourned.

FRENCH SELF-DENIAL IN HEAT AND LIGHT (Canadian Press Despatch) PARIS, November 17.—The minister of the interior, Louis Malvy, has instructed the prefects of every department in France to appeal, in cooperation with the mayors of the communes, to the people to reduce as far as possible the lighting of their homes and business establishments. Bills posted throughout Paris signed by the officials invite every household to restrict both heating and lighting. The poster concludes: "It is hoped that these demands will be manfully accepted in view of the need of seconding the efforts of our soldiers in the trenches. It is the duty of the people in the rear to add to the force of the armies. The whole of France must fight!"
