Robinson of Philadelphia has been in port for some days from New York, discharging a cargo of coal for A. Pickard & Co., and yesterday another "big one," the Bertha L. Downs, of New Haven, Conn., with coal from New York for C. Lyons & Co., arrived. This vessel which makes the trip in ten days, is said to be valued at the present time at \$80,000. Two large three-masted are also in port, the Cora M. Stanley, which is on her way from a New Brunswick port to New York with laths and is anchored in the wharves waiting here for some seamen, and the Ruth Robinson, of Boston, which arrived yesterday from Liverpool, England, after a long passage, with salt for Carvell Bros., and is now moored at Pownall Wharf.

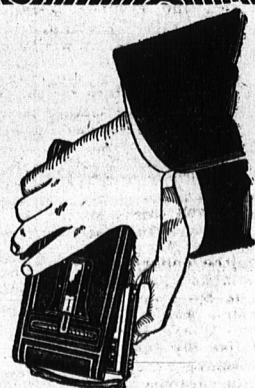

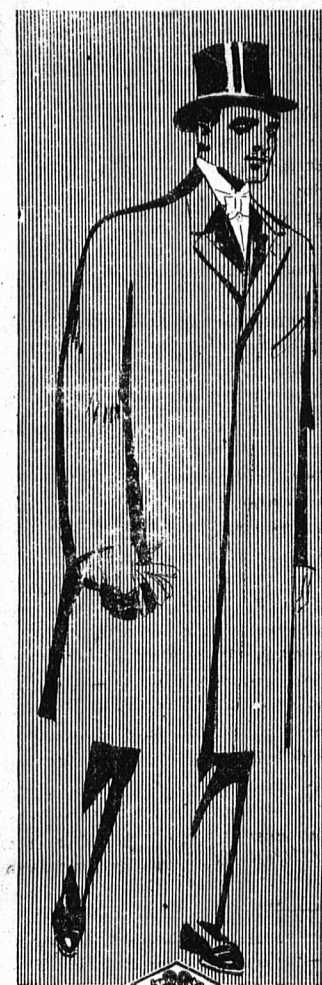

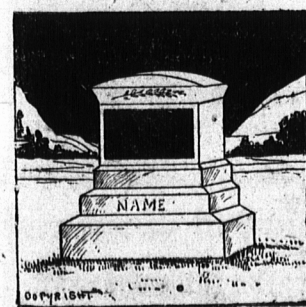

BERLIN, via wireless to Sayville, Aug. 31—Rumanian forces which penetrated the Austrians yesterday were repulsed, according to an Austrian War Office statement reported today. The Austrians captured a position in the mountains. The official report shows that the Rumanians have penetrated well into the interior of Transylvania. The Austrians have fallen back west of Oak-Shereda, five miles north of Kronstadt which is six miles over the border. The announcement follows: On the heights of Hercules Furdo, known as Mesbia, near the Cron Gates of the Danube, fifteen miles north of Orsova, Rumanian attacks were repulsed.
