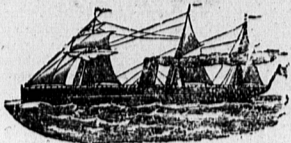

Rev. Mr. Linton of Crapaud who has been in Halifax attending the various committee meetings of the Diocesan Synod being held there was a passenger to this City on the Northumberland yesterday afternoon.

The death occurred at Uigg on Monday last, the 14th inst of Margaret Bruce, aged 41, daughter of the late Alexander Bruce, and wife of Simon Campbell. The deceased had been ill for some time, and had suffered greatly. She leaves to mourn a sorrowing husband and six children, the eldest aged twelve, and the following brothers and sisters: James in Regina, Lauchlin and Daniel in Montana, John in Kingsboro, P. E. I., Alexander in Boston and D. A. in Charlottetown, Mrs. David Bruce in East Baltic, Mrs. John T. Harper in Boston and Mrs. James Ching in Boston. The funeral which was very largely attended took place at Orwell on Wednesday last. Rev. D. B. McLeod officiating at the church and grave.

At the police court in this city yesterday morning three offenders against the act respecting the sale of cigarettes to minors were disposed of. Mary Haddad and T. E. Hagan were fined five dollars and Martin O'Brien was fined ten dollars; the heavier fine in the latter case being caused by reason of the fact that evidence was given of a Sunday sale. A number of youthful witnesses appeared in the above cases, all of whom were reprimanded by His Honor. In one case a chap of thirteen said his mother had frequently given him cents to purchase cigarettes for himself and his younger brother, aged 11. They had not been seen to smoke by their father. In the case of theft of pelts against young Hopkinson and McDonald, the former was given three months in jail. The latter, on his first appearance, was dismissed with a warning. H. Bell, for being drunk, was fined \$2.

A sad fatality occurred at Iona a couple of days ago by which the two year old child of Benjamin Welsh, section foreman, was burned to death. Mr. Welsh was away from home attending to his work at the time and Mrs. Welsh had gone out to attend to some cattle, leaving the two children sitting by the wood stove. A spark from a burning ember it seems, flew out from the stove and set fire to the little one's dress and in a few minutes she was enveloped in flames. John McCabe and Owen Hughes who happened to be passing the house saw the flames and heard the child's cries. They quickly ran in and quenched the flames which enveloped the little one. The rescue, however, did not come in time to save the child's life, for she lingered in great agony until the evening, when despite all that could be done, her spirit passed away. Mr. and Mrs. Welsh have the sympathy of the community in their sad bereavement.
