ANIMALS OF LONG AGO

VIII. THE EARLIEST KNOWN BIRDS

An interesting subject to study is "geology." It is "the science of the earth—past and present."

In the small space we have, it is hard to tell many of the reasons for believing that the strange animals I have described, ever lived; but if you made a careful study of geology, you would see how the rocks have saved the story through the ages.

One part of the story which is

not at all complete is the history of birds. For some reason, their bones are very scarce in the rock layers. That is most likely due to the fact that the bones of birds are lighter than the bones of other animals. Animal skeletons which have been best preserved are those whose owners died in water and sank to the bottom, to be covered by mud or sand. A dead bird will float on water; and there was not such a good chance for ancient birds to be covered by the ooze at the bottom.

Yet we have proof that there were birds living at the same time as Old Steggy, Three Horns and the Tyrant Lizard. In Germany bones and feather marks have been found in rock dating back to the Age of Terrible Lizards.

What strange birds they were! Their tails were long, they had claws at the bends of their wings, and there were teeth in their beaks! A few modern birds have claws at the bends of their wings, but who ever saw a modern bird with teeth?

The wings of the earliest known birds were shaped something like those of modern birds; but there were spreading feathers on their legs. There is reason to believe that they were better at gliding through the air than at actual flying.

Could those early birds sing? We

do not know but we may guess that they were not masters of the art. Yet their presence on the earth was a promise of the time when our spring-time should be made joyous by the songs of our feathered friends.
