THE MUNICIPAL SYSTEM.

A writer in the Examiner of Saturday last over the signature of Farmer and under the caption of "Danger Ahead" intimates that THE GUARDIAN in advising the introduction of the Municipal System is only preparing the way for a Government measure to that end. We confess that we would gladly see any party leader take up the matter and carry it into practical effect, but we have not heard as yet the first favorable intimation in that regard from any prominent person in either party in this Province. We are certainly not speaking for the Farquharson Government in the matter. It was a Conservative leader, the present Mr. Justice King now of the Supreme Court of Canada, but then Premier of New Brunswick, that gave to the sister Province its present Municipal System.

"Farmer" is apparently very ignorant as to the nature of the Municipal System, but none the less we welcome him to the discussion. The only one thing necessary to secure the adoption of the system here is that the intelligent citizens of the Island shall acquire a knowledge of its principles and its operation. For that reason it is well that objections shall be made. We are not likely to hear more numerous objections than were long ago urged against the system in the other Provinces of Canada, nor any that cannot be easily and effectually disposed of.

"Farmer" says the Municipal System means the multiplication of officials. It does indeed mean that the people shall elect Councilors to order and control their local affairs. Beyond this it does not involve the appointment of a single official, and the Councilors serve without pay. "Farmer" says it means the introduction of political parties and feuds into every section of the Province. Some experience in the county Councils of New Brunswick shows that they are almost as clear of party politics as are the directors of a cheese factory, or of a bank. A great advantage of the system is that it enables the people to be served by the men of their choice without regard to politics.

But says "Farmer," the new system means increased taxation, litigation and lawsuits for damages. The writer of this paragraph was for years a member of the first Municipal Council of Kings County New Brunswick. We are not aware that in a quarter of a century that Council has ever had a lawsuit, or occasion to defend itself against an action for damages. And as to taxation, the Council at its first session reduced the taxes paid by the people of the County by one eighth part. We shall be glad to hear from any others who have honest objections to urge against the Municipal System.

A Nebraska man claims to have solved the fuel problem by mixing petroleum and certain other ingredients with common earth. In these days nothing astonishes us in the way of a new invention. Water is commonly the most ready agent for extinguishing fire but a brilliant burning gas is now made from water. What is most probable however is that the Nebraska man's fuel is mostly made up of other ingredients than common earth, after the manner in which a man once made "stone soup." In that case the stone remained after the soup had been eaten, the same in size shape and weight as it was before.

We have more correspondence than we can use for the day on the subject of prayers for the dead. A second letter from "Queen's County" arguing that the Church of England is a Catholic and not a Protestant Church, is purposely withheld until its writer may have the opportunity of perusing the letter of Churchman in today's GUARDIAN. Perhaps, on reflection, "Queen's County" may prefer to withdraw or re-write his communication. We cannot afford much space to controversial letters during the session of the Legislature.

Hon. Mr. Foster is said to favor the trial of the Gothenburg system for regulating the liquor traffic, but only, we presume because prohibition for the Dominion is not available at present. The system derives its name from the city where it was first tried as a municipal measure—Gothenburg, a seaport of Sweden, population about 110,000. By the system all private traffic in liquors is abolished, and in its stead agents appointed by the city, in a limited number of places, sell intoxicants. In other words the city enjoys the entire profit of the liquor trade, and its revenue thus obtained is so great that other taxes have been largely reduced or swept away. Mr. Foster would have the Government of Canada undertake what the City of Gothenburg did. Much might be said for and against this proposition. The Canadian Government is now and has been a very large sharer in the profits of the liquor trade, but not rightfully so. We shall return to the subject.
