May Name Calgary Lawyer To Cabinet

(By Canadian Press Staff Writer) REGINA, April 18—(CP)—Prime Minister St. Laurent may name Calgary lawyer Marshall Porter to a cabinet post before the federal election, it is learned today, as one step in his efforts to build up Liberal power in the four western provinces where the party now holds 17 of 71 seats.

Between speeches and functions which have been the outward marks of his western tour, he has found time to have a number of private talks with party workers—many of whom are far from ruling out a June or July election and are acting accordingly.

There is no indication yet, after a week in British Columbia and Alberta, that he has tipped his workers off as to when the vote will be.

In Alberta, dominated by the Social Credit Party, the Prime Minister appealed for support with the argument that no other party than the Liberal is capable of winning the majority that would allow a stable government. In divided British Columbia, he is believed to have held up the spectre of minority government as a reason for party toll.

In his middle 60s, Mr. Porter has important connections with the oil and grain industries as well as other qualifications which party strategists think would make him a logical man to succeed Hon. James MacKinnon, minister without portfolio, and an Edmonton member, who is expected to go to the Senate shortly before the election.

The June 15 date for the British Columbia provincial election raises interesting possibilities about the federal vote. Premier Johnson is said to have asked for at least two clear weeks between the elections, which if granted, could still mean an early July vote for the country as a whole.

Meanwhile, Liberal party workers range fairly widely in their private predictions about how their party will do when the election falls. But none appear ready to prophesy anything like a sweeping resurgence of the party all through the west.

This is the way the provinces now stand federally: British Columbia, seven C.C.F.; four Liberals; four Progressive Conservative and one Independent who generally supports the government.

Alberta, 12 Social Credit, two Liberals, two P.C., one vacancy; Saskatchewan, 18 C.C.F., two Liberals, one P.C.; Manitoba, nine Liberals, five C.C.F., three P.C.'s.

Thus, with 30 members, the C.C.F. now is the strongest party in the west. The Liberals, leading in one of four provinces, are second with 17. The Social Crediters are third with 12 and the Conservatives fourth with 10.

Review of Legal Aspects In Current Seamen's Strike

OTTAWA, April 18—(CP)—Legality of manoeuvres in the deepest shipping strike is a big question mark as both sides charge opponents with illegal moves.

Fine points of labor law are involved, apart from any offences in the waterfront violence touched off by the strike.

Chief question posed by supporters of the striking Canadian Seamen's Union (C.S.U.) is the legality of the shipowners signing an agreement with the rival Seafarer's International Union (A.F.L.) while the C.S.U. had a contract for crews.

The C.S.U. claims this was in violation of the Federal labor code.

Whether it actually was depends on the form of the agreement. At the time the strike was called about two weeks ago, conciliation proceedings between the owners and the C.S.U. had reached the point where either party could legally stage a strike or lockout.

Beyond that point, the situation was somewhat different for the government-owned Canadian National Steamships— with which the C.S.U. was certified as official bargaining agent—and the private shipowners, with whom the union was not.

With the C.S.U. on strike against the government line, C.N.S. was entitled to recruit labor in an attempt to break the strike, though an interpretation of the labor code is that it could not deal with another union while the C.S.U. was still certified.

Once the C.N.S. had ships manned with new crews, it could take steps to break the certification of the Seamen's Union by calling for a vote under the Canada Labor Relations Board.

The private owners were entitled to make a deal with the S.I.U. to provide ship labor.

They were not entitled to sign a collective bargaining contract at that time, because they had no employees who were members of the seafarers.

But once seafarers' crews were placed aboard their ships, they could go ahead and sign collective agreements with them.

Whether or not the owners' arrangements with the S.I.U. were legal hinges on what procedure was followed.

It is understood that no official information has been received here on what form the union-owners agreement took.
