Musical Festival Benefits Rural School Children

The South Shore Musical Festival was planned by the Women's Institutes to encourage the children in their communities to learn to sing and to read. They felt that a competition in a smaller group than the Charlottetown Festival would give the beginners more opportunity.

The rural districts of Prince Edward Island suffer for want of musical training and so until music is taught in all our schools, the Musical Festival is an answer to our problem; for while training for the competition, the children learn a great deal about music. We must train our children to sing, for unless something drastic is done, our rural churches will be using phonographs for music in their services. For years we have not had any musical instructions in the majority of our rural schools. All children can sing, unless they are tone deaf, which means that they cannot recognize a tune; but some children may be slower than others, to learn to recognize intervals in sound. No child should be eliminated from a class for he or she may gradually learn to recognize sounds and to sing the notes of the scale. That is why we have asked the teachers not to eliminate any junior pupils from the classes in the Festival, the competition is for the schools and not for picked choirs.

We have included in this Festival classes in Handicraft, which we feel is an art as well as music or elocution. We hope that the entries for these classes will make the exhibit an annual affair.—S.

gow are holding meetings threatening to keep their children from school unless the education authority gets busy building new classrooms and modernizing existing ones.

The authority is already paying out more than £6,300,000 annually on its services. It says it can't afford to pay teachers more and that it is doing all it can to improve school conditions. In addition, it claims, it needs more teachers.

Although what is happening in Glasgow is not general, it emphasizes the issue of teachers' wages just prior to the next wages conference between the N.U.T. and local authorities Nov. 23.

Teacher salary scales in Britain are complex. They range from a starting rate of £300 a year for men and £270 for women, less five per cent for superannuation.

British Teachers Get Set For Finish Fight On Wages

Thousands of teachers in Britain's "state" schools are getting set to renew their fight for increased salaries and allowances. They mean to press the issue to a finish.

Last July, the National Union of Teachers, which embraces most of the estimated 200,000 teachers in schools run by local authorities, applied for a flat increase of £150 (\$465) annually. There were some conferences and the discussions were then adjourned until late November.

Teachers in Britain's public (i.e. private) schools are not affected by these claims. There the masters work on a previously-agreed salary paid by the school.

Discontent in Ranks

The N.U.T. claims to have a good cause. It says a good many of its teachers are making considerably less than the national average minimum wage of £7 a week. They get no income-tax concessions for outlays on such necessary items as books.

The union says there is discontent in teaching ranks. It has not mentioned the possibility of a strike, but in one or two places local feeling has made itself felt.

In Glasgow, for instance, the city faces a crisis. Glasgow's more than 6,000 teachers, handling some 174,000 children, are discussing a strike unless they get a flat increase of 25 a week.
