Canada's Gross Liabilities Now Over 19 Billions

(By The Canadian Press) OTTAWA, June 27—Canada's net debt as at March 31, 1946, was estimated by Finance Minister D. S. Lewis in his budget speech tonight at \$13,034,986,000, an increase of \$1,736,703,000 from the end of the previous fiscal year. In 1938, the first year before the outbreak of war, the net debt stood at \$3,101,897,570. The increase at the end of the 1945-46 year was \$822,000,000 lower than in the previous year. The increase represented the deficit of revenues as compared with expenditures for the 1945-46 fiscal year. The revenues, not including refundable taxes, were estimated at about \$2,650,000 compared with expenditures of approximately \$4,811,000,000. It is estimated that the gross unsecured funded debt including deposit certificates, treasury bills, and the estimated refundable portion of personal income tax and excess profits tax of the Dominion outstanding at the close of the fiscal year 1945-46 will amount to \$18,807,783,000, said Mr. Lewis.

Other Liabilities

"Other liabilities consisting chiefly of deposits and trust accounts, insurance, pension and guaranty accounts are estimated at \$2,198,478,000. The gross liabilities of the Dominion on March 31, 1946, therefore, are estimated at \$18,009,305,000.

"On the other side of the balance sheet there are active assets estimated at \$4,336,000,000 consisting of cash loans and advances and investments less a reserve of \$1,000,000. The results represent the estimated net debt of the Dominion as at March 31, 1946.

The funded debt carried annual interest charges of \$436,000,000. The average rate of interest was 2.76 per cent as compared with 2.78 per cent as at March 31, 1945, the slight increase being due in the first three months of the addition to the debt during the year to the form of three per cent victory bonds.
