The urgent need of widening the railway cuttings in the deepest parts was made apparent by the slight drift that prevailed on Saturday. In a short time that afternoon the trains were almost all blocked while in Charlottetown the day appeared an ideal winter one. It is probable throughout March many similar hold ups may take place if some labor is not placed on the line.

As a result of the final examinations held last week at the Union Commercial College, Hedley W. McKay, of Park Corner, and Horace McWilliams, of West Cape, have been granted the Business Diploma of the College, with honors. This, as already announced, means that they secured the exceptionally high aggregate of 575, or an average of 82 per cent in all subjects. These young men entered College in September last, and all heartily congratulate them on their success. Another student taking the finals was successful in six of the prescribed subjects, but owing to the fact that the pass mark of 90 was not made in spelling he cannot have his Diploma until such time as he passes in that subject.

RECENTLY a boot and shoe "Knight of the Grip," who is most successful in "bagging" large orders, particularly in the western part of the Province, received the following letter dated February fourteenth. On first reading he set down to persistence, which was broken only when he imagined he could hear the suffering of the "poor cattle" as outlined below:—"Sir.—At a meeting of the Boot and Shoe merchants of—the question came up, which traveller is responsible for this interruption of traffic and bad weather generally.
