U. S. and British Athletes to Meet in London

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—Formal acceptance of an invitation for United States Athletes to compete in a dual meet at London with repres-

entatives of the British Empire was announced today by the A. A. U. The meet will be held on July 19, immediately following the Olympic track and field programme at Paris. The program for the meet, which will be similar to one held in London, after the 1920 Olympics as suggested by British athletic authorities included eight relay races, ranging in distance from 400 yards to four miles and the running broad and high jumps. The amateur athletic union also has approved the proposed Irish games at Dublin, where the Irish Free State plans to hold an athletic tournament for Irishmen and all those of Irish extraction next August. An invitation has been extended to Irish athletes residing in the United States.

Zev Ready to Meet Any Horse

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 22.—Zev, American champion, and the fastest money winner, will meet any thoroughbred in the world that is offered as a challenger to his title, Sam Hildreth, his trainer, said before leaving here for Baltimore. Hildreth said he would put his thoroughbred star in training for the match race with My Own, Admiral Grayson's star, as soon as he was given a little rest on his return to Baltimore. Zev's entry in the proposed international race depends upon the result of the match race with My Own and on the wishes of the men promoting the race, according to Hildreth. Hildreth said also that it had been planned to send Zev to Europe next spring and that he probably would be entered in one or more of the British turf classics. Horsemen here gave all the credit for Zev's victory over In Memoriam to the horsemanship of Earl Sante, the star jockey. ference in powerful fashion, and runs his team in a way that few have ever done it. Many rate him the greatest quarterback the East ever developed. This fellow dominates every game he plays in, with his dazzling and fine defensive play.

There is no doubt that Dobie has a great team. Yet there is some criticism levelled at the New Yorkers because their schedule has been with one or two exceptions, an easy one. Dartmouth, Colgate,

Colby and Penn are among the teams that have tried to stem the rush this fall. For a team which might lay claim to leadership in the East, this schedule is not any where near a test. Just how good Cornell really is seems a pretty hard problem to solve. Cornell vs. Yale, or Syracuse, or West Virginia—anyone of those three, would have been worth tramping many leagues to witness this fall.

Policy of U. S. has not been Red-Blooded

NEW YORK, Nov. 20.—Otto H. Kahn international banker told the Foreign Policy Association yesterday that it was the duty of the United States to determine what should be done in the Franco-German crisis. "I will not criticize the policy of the United States," he said, "but certainly it has not been a red-blooded one. The United States should determine first in its own mind what should be taken into its confidence. Let it then state openly what the issues and circumstances are under which the United States would help."
