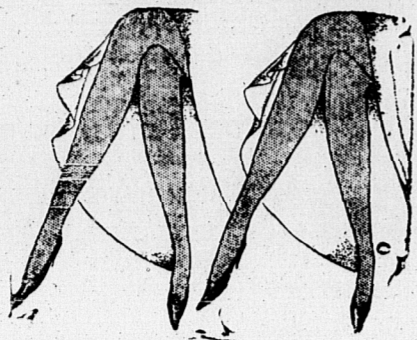

—BOARD OF TRADE—The Board of Trade, Summerside, met on Monday night at the home of Mr. P. W. Clarkin, District Passenger Agent, to discuss some important matters dealing with the train service to Summerside. The meeting took place in the Superintendent's private car. Among those present were Mayor Lidstone, Mr. Begg, president of the Board of Trade; Mr. L. R. Allen, M.L.A.; Mr. A. E. McLean, M.P.; Mr. J. J. Morris, Manager Provincial Bank and Mr. Chas. Rogers. The first matter dealt with was the late arrival of the morning train from Charlottetown. Frequently this train was an hour to two hours late. The cause was attributed to the heavy traffic in freight. Sometimes there were thirteen or more freight cars on. It was suggested that an extra engine be put on the service to take care of the freight cars. Another grievance was the often too crowded condition of the jitney. Mr. McNutt promised to have the trailer put on whenever it was found necessary to accommodate passengers. It was brought to the attention of Mr. McNutt that the shunting of cars at the level crossing at the east end of Water Street was at times a great drawback to travellers on the road, who were often held up for some time on this account. There were three sets of rails at this point. The approach to the town was not considered, by those present, to be an ideal place for the shunting of freight cars. Mr. McNutt promised to have an engineer look over the situation. He also said he would see what could be done to have the morning train arrive on time. He left with Mr. Clarkin on the noon train for the west of the Province. S.

Scout Uniform
Cubs, Scouts and Rovers should wear the Scout Uniform at Scout meetings. At the Provincial Secretary meeting from 25 to 65 wore their uniforms.
The Province of Saskatchewan has a fund of thirty six hundred dollars annually for the advancement of Scouting. This is raised by procuring 1800 associate members who pay \$2.00 annually.

Scouting and Education
In all the Provinces except Prince Edward Island, Manitoba and Quebec, Boy Scouts receive grants from

their Provincial Governments. This is usually administered under the Department of Education. In Saskatchewan Scouting and schools are closely linked and certain school trustees demand scout training in their teacher.
