SCHOOL INSPECTORS.—On Friday morning Prof. Ross addressed the public School Inspectors at P. W. College on "Nutrition and Polination". He pointed out that there are the two great things that plants have to do and that all the various forms of plants, particularly the size and shape of leaves, have been brought about by the effort of the plant to secure an abundance of food, while the variations in the colors of flowers are due to the effort to attract beneficial insects and the forms of flowers are due very largely to the effort to keep out hurtful ones. To the plant itself the leaves and the root hairs are of great importance. The stem is only subsidiary to the spreading out of the leaves to the sunshine, while to man the stem is of greatest importance as yielding the lumber. From man's standpoint many flowers "waste their sweetness on the desert air," but not so from the flower's standpoint. It requires insects to assist in the work of pollination, and to attract them many flowers are beautiful colors and secrete in its nectar which often gives out exquisite perfume. If we will always bear in mind that plants are living things that must feed themselves and reproduce their species, it will aid us to the understanding of many of what we now term the secrets of nature.
