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THE EUROPEAN WAR CLOUD BREAKS, PEACE SMILES AGAIN

NORTH SEA OUTRAGE GOES TO THE HAGUE TRIBUNAL

Russia Has Consented to this Course—British Foreign Minister and Russian Ambassador to Name Arbitrators Today—Russian Ships Which Fired the Fatal Shots Detained in Port to Await the Issue—Balance of Baltic Fleet to Proceed—Premier Balfour Makes the Announcement—Latest from Port Arthur Siege.

A SETTLEMENT REACHED.

LONDON, Oct. 28, 5.07 p. m.—[Special]—It is announced that the crisis threatened in the relations of Great Britain and Russia because of the North Sea incident has been averted and a satisfactory settlement reached.

GOES TO THE HAGUE.

A proposition to refer the matter to a Mixed Court of Inquiry has been accepted and the inquiry will be held at The Hague under the rules of The Hague Convention.

ARBITRATORS NAMED.

The appointment of the Arbitrators will be discussed tomorrow between Ambassador Benckendorff and Lansdowne.

BALTIC FLEET STOPPED.

In the meantime orders have gone from Petersburg to Vice Admiral Vensky to hold his squadron in place, and Spain will

be asked to permit those Russian ships concerned in the incident to remain there until the inquiry is completed.

PART OF FLEET PROCEEDS.

The remainder of the squadron is expected to proceed to its destination.

A NATIONAL CRISIS.

SOUTHAMPTON, Oct. 28—[Special]—Premier Balfour addressed a great meeting here tonight.

He was given a tremendous ovation. On rising Mr. Balfour said:

"By no will of mine this great assemblage coincides with a moment of national difficulty.

THE PEOPLE AROUSED.

"Since the assembly was arranged events have happened which have stirred to their depths every section and every class of the community, every subject of His Majesty and the conscience

of the English-speaking people of the world as well as the general sentiment of civilized Europe."

A DEPLORABLE TRAGEDY.

Continuing he said "he believed the lamentable and deplorable tragedy of Oct. 27 would not end in war. That dreadful contingency had been averted."

REFERRED TO ARBITRATION

"The matter had been referred to an International Commission. There would also be a Board of Trade inquiry with, he hoped, the assistance of representatives of the Russian Government."

PORT ARTHUR SIEGE.

SHANGHAI, Oct. 28—[Special]—It is reported that the Japanese have occupied two forts to the northeast of Port Arthur; that a Russian battleship in the harbor has been sunk and that the Japanese attack on the fortress is becoming more furious. This report lacks confirmation.

LIPTON WILL NOT COME NEXT YEAR

It is Accepted Beyond Doubt That the Baronet Will Not Have a Challenge for 1905.

GLASGOW, Oct. 21.—So far as outward appearances go, the scheme for reviving the America's cup contest, and particularly for engineering a contest to take place next year, is now as wholly and entirely dead as it was before Sir Thomas Lipton gave confirmation to the statement that he contemplated the building of a Shamrock IV. It is unwillingly accepted as beyond doubt that there will be no Lipton racer to attract the eyes of the yachting men to Sandy Hook next year, and, however keen the general baronet may be in his desire to revive the contest, it is difficult to see where the yacht is to come from, unless there is a distinct change in the position. It is known to a few that there was a little friction among those most directly interested in the challenge at the conclusion of the last cup contest, and it is also known that in the bitterness of disappointment there were statements made which in the interest of the sport would have been better left unsaid. It was not anticipated that any recollection of these things would rankle to the extent of interfering seriously with the arrangements for renewing the contest, but this is exactly what has happened.

OFFICIALS DEFY COURT'S ORDER

Band of Gypsies Ordered Deported Liberated by Judge. They Ignore Decision.

MONTREAL, Oct. 27.—A conflict arose here today between the judiciary and the dominion department of immigration. Two families of gypsies landed here by Allan line steamer Ionian, were received by the Canadian immigration officials, and ordered to be deported. While they were aboard the steamer habeas corpus proceedings were opened, with the result that they were liberated by Judge Fortin, of the superior court, who decided the gypsies were not undesirable and could not be deported. Tonight an order was received from W. D. Scott, superintendent of Canadian immigration, ordering the gypsies to be deported despite the decision of the court. An effort was made to capture the immigrants and placed them on board the steamer, which will sail at daybreak, but the Allen line management refused to obey the order of the immigration department, in the view of the superior court decision.

STILL NO LIGHT ON THE MURDER MYSTERY

The Coroner's Jury Met Again Last Night and then Adjourned for a Week—Officials and Detectives Are Baffled.

The mystery of the murder of Harriet Warren at the Charlottetown Hospital Corner on the night of October 13th is still unsolved.

The coroner's jury which has been sitting in secret session periodically since the crime was committed, met again last night in the Police Court Room and after hearing the evidence of Jailer Hamill, who produced some of the clothes worn by the prisoner Power, and the testimony of Miss May Jenkins, the Court was further adjourned for a week. The Guardian is able to state authoritatively that there is no new light on the tragedy and the officers as well as the Pinkerton detectives Messrs Green and Martin have been unable to obtain any clue that would lead to a solution of the mystery. It is understood that the detectives have reached the conclusion that the crime was committed by an insane person and that there was no motive for the murder. With this established the next step was to secure evidence that would convict the one who did the deed but up to the present time there is little to point the crime to any of the suspected parties. The authorities are still working patiently however and if they do not meet with success, citizens may rest assured that nothing possible will be left undone to solve the mystery.

The belief exists among some people that some of the parties concerned in the crime know more about the affair than they have told the authorities. It is regrettable if this be so for any light however small may do much towards the solution of a mystery that has given much worry to the local authorities as well as to those who are working on the case from abroad.

JAPANESE HAVE TAKEN JERDAGA

Fighting Began at Ten Thursday Evening South-West of Mukden.—a Seized Steamer Released.

MUKDEN, October 27.—Fighting began at 10 o'clock last evening southeast of Mukden. The Japanese have advanced to the village of Jerdaga, which they are reported to have captured after a fight lasting until this morning.

NAGASAKI, October 27.—The British steamer Sishan has been released by order of the Japanese naval court at Susubo. The Sishan, owned by Thomas W. Richardson, of London, was seized by the Japanese off New Chwang on October 7th. She had sailed from Hong Kong and when captured had on board a cargo of flour and cattle.
