Famous Trophy Leaves Canada

JASPER PARK LODGE, Alta., Sept. 15.—The famous totem pole trophy, the feature event of the Jasper Park Lodge golf week, leaves Canada for the first time in its four years of history. Noted as the emblem of Western Canada golf classic, it has previously reposed in the place of honor at Vancouver golf clubs, but for the coming year it will grace the Nassau Golf and Country Club at Long Island, a silent tribute to the skill of Gardiner T. White, runner-up in the Canadian Amateur Championships, previously played on the Jasper Park Lodge course, and the winner of the big event of the golf week.

In presenting the famous trophy to Mr. White, both Walter Pratt, General manager of the Canadian National Hotel system, and Hon. Dr. W. Egbert, Lieut. Governor of the province of Alberta, stressed the pleasure it gave them to see the trophy won by an American Golfer of international fame and the applause that greeted Mr. Pratt's opening remarks and his honor in presenting the trophy, showed that the sixty odd contestants in the week's events heartily approved of Mr. White as the totem pole trophy winner, and appreciated the remarkable exhibition of golf that he gave.

Throughout the tournament Mr. White showed that he was in excellent form, and after the first match against par, which he won handily by a score of 2 up, he was generally looked upon as the winner of the trophy, although it was conceded that Jack Starkey, of Edmonton and Ben Cool, of Calgary, would give him a battle for the honor. This was particularly true in the case of Mr. Starkey, for the semi-final match between him and Mr. White was not decided until the 18th hole was reached.

In the finals, however, Ben Cool of Calgary was defeated in the fourteenth hole by 5 up and four to go. Mr. Cool played better golf than this verdict would indicate and keenly contested the match until the final result.

During the afternoon prizes for the various week's events were presented by Hon. Dr. Egbert, in the presence of the various contestants and lodge guests. The presentation was made from in front of the main bungalow of the lodge and at the table on which they were displayed were Mr. A. J.
