Disabled Veterans Meet The King And Queen. This picture shows Their Majesties during their unscheduled visit to Shaughnessy Military Hospital in Vancouver, in conversation with Dr. G. A. Minoran, an official of the hospital. In the foreground is H. A. Ross, one of seven veterans too ill to be taken to the procession route, with all of whom Their Majesties shook hands and chatted.
