Plan Big Fishing Centre At Louisburg

HALIFAX, Oct. 2 (CP)—Following the path of Gen. James Wolfe, the dapper man behind the desk formed his forces today for an attack on Louisburg—but this time it will be a friendly onslaught.

"Gentlemen, I want to tell you the story of Louisburg," Harold Connolly, Provincial Minister of Industry, told newspaper men at a press conference today.

Recalling the town's capture from the French by English troops under Gen. Wolfe in 1758, one reporter put in:

"Don't go back as far as the capture."

"Oh, no," said Mr. Connolly, "this is a happy occasion."

Then he proceeded to outline plans which may make the northeastern Cape Breton town of 1,500 one of Nova Scotia's leading fishing centres.

Within three years, if all goes well, the new pier constructed at Louisburg by the Federal Government may be handling 45,000,000 pounds of fish a year.

The idea, explained Mr. Connolly, all started in 1943 when the newly-formed Fisheries Division of his Department surveyed the Province for possible spots which could be developed.

Louisburg, just a few hours sail from several major off-shore fishing banks, was a logical spot. The Federal Government chipped in and completed a new pier this spring.

Then Mr. Connolly started looking around for customers.

Three large concerns—National Sea Products, Halifax; F. J. O'Hara and Sons, Boston; and Gordon-Pew, Gloucester, Mass.—were interested.

Now it's reached the negotiation stage and the three companies may be the ones to host Louisburg into a thriving fishing town.

The Provincial Government's share of the project—construction of a large, \$250,000 public cold-storage plant—gets underway soon when tenders for the plant will be called for.

Then when the fishing fleet—probably to be built in Nova Scotia yards—is ready, Louisburg is in business. The cold storage plant will likely be completed by the spring of 1950.

As explained by Mr. Connolly, the project will mean more work ashore and will also stabilize the industry for the town in particular and the Province in general.

After a few years of intensive development—and if present conditions hold—it would probably increase the Province's fishing industry as much as 20 or 25 per cent.

The complete, long-range development would probably mean a total outlay of \$1,500,000 on behalf of the province in the way of improved facilities.

"But," said Mr. Connolly, "we would be developing the fisheries, one of our primary industries, and one that can stand development."

Mexico Develops Shrimp Industry

Worth Millions

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 2 (AP)—This is a story of how a little shrimp got to market.

It all started about 20 years ago when a group of Florida fishermen visiting the west coast of Mexico discovered extensive beds of big, fat, sweet shrimp in the blue waters of the Gulf of California.

During those 20 years the shrimp business on the west coast has grown into a \$14,000,000-a-year business.

As word spread on the size of the shrimp beds, Japanese fishermen moved to the area, obtained concessions, and agreed to show Mexicans how to catch shrimp. Fishermen said, however, all they got was a promise.

For 10 years the Japanese monopolized the shrimp beds and operated a shuttle service with shrimp for Japan. Then in 1940 former president Abelardo L. Rodriguez told President Manuel Avila Camacho the Japanese fishing colonies on the west coast were fronts for military camps.

Guaymas A-la Camacho, convinced, cancelled concessions and Rodriguez chased the Japanese out, after agreeing to buy 20 boats and start a Mexican shrimp business.

The shrimp industries thrive from Guaymas to Mazatlan on the east coast of the Gulf of California.

"Green Shrimps"

The newly developed "green shrimp (uncooked)" industry has split almost the market. The current season which started last September and ends late in June is expected to produce more than 15,000,000 pounds of shrimp most of which goes to the United States market.

Rodriguez formed the company "Compania Productos Marinos de Guaymas" — capitalized at 2,500,000 pesos (\$500,000). Later he turned the shrimp industry over to a group of co-operatives which operate all along the coast.

The Compania Productos Marinos continues to exist but other quick freezing plants have sprung up. Among the most important is Productos Congelados at Guaymas and Pesquer in Tepic, Jalisco on the Bay of San Carlos several hundred miles south.

Hundreds of refrigerated railroad cars now carry the frozen shrimp to San Diego, Calif., the main distribution centre.

The heads, veins and shrimp frozen in five-pound blocks and packed in waxed cartons are shipped in 50-pound containers.

Besides 12,000,000 to 15,000,000 pounds of frozen shrimp, about 1,800,000 pounds of fresh shrimp packed in crushed ice cross the border into the United States.

More than 30,000 tons of ice are used each season by the shrimp boats, plants and railroad cars.

lift, installed over the after hold of the Scaldis, will be used to launch and retrieve the strange craft.

The walls of this spherical cabin, constructed from a special steel alloy, are 3 1/2 inches thick and an underwater pressure of more than 50,000 tons.

The bathyscaphe actually consists of two separate hemispheres placed one upon the other. There is no joint between the halves. They are held in position by several heavy bolts, but the external pressure of the water will ensure that the cabin remains perfectly watertight.

For observation purposes, two plastic portholes have been fitted into the sides. Quartz electric headlamps, each producing 3,000 candle-power, will light up the water as the craft descends.

The cabin will be hooked by a substantial metal framework to a buoyant chamber containing several hundred pounds of lead. The buoyant chamber, filled with 8,000 gallons of gas. Concrete blocks and a quantity of iron shot, weighing 4,600 pounds, will be attached to the chamber by a series of electro-magnets. Amount of gas in the chamber and weight of ballast have been so balanced that the buoyant chamber, at the time for launching, will float on the water with the bathyscaphe suspended just below the surface.

To descend, the gas will be blown off in small quantities. A huge guide rope weighted with a block of concrete will tell the scientists their position below the surface.

BUILD \$6,000 CENTRE FOR EDMONTON YOUTH

EDMONTON, Oct. 4 — A dream is finally coming to reality for the Edmonton Athletic Club. Work has started on \$6,000 clubhouse project to provide youth here with all kinds of sport activity.

The project was made possible by a city council grant to athletes clubs of a plot of land. The project will include an open-air rink, gymnasium, baseball diamond and other sport facilities.

Al Anderson, president of the club, said, "One main reason for building the rink is to have a place for the bantam hockey league to perform and develop young players."

Water Pressure Will Seal Globe

BRUSSELS, Oct. 1 (AP)—Probably the most comprehensive and compact laboratory ever built is the six-foot metal sphere in which 62-year-old Prof. Auguste Piccard and his Belgian assistant, Prof. Max Cosyns, hope shortly to make a 2 1/2-mile dive into the Gulf of Guiney.

Now aboard the motor vessel Scaldis — which sailed Sept. 15 for Dakar where trial descents are to be made — the 10-ton steel sphere was built at Brussels by engineers who worked day and night in an unobtrusive dockside workshop.

The 4,000-ton Scaldis was placed at Prof. Piccard's disposal by the Belgian government. On her bridge is a battery of radar and super-sonic devices loaned by the British Admiralty, with which the surface team will be able to follow the undersea course of the six-foot "bathyscaphe."
