**CANADIAN PACIFIC ACQUIRES ELDER DEMPSTER VESSELS**

The Formal Announcement Made by the President—He Outlines a Scheme for the Service—Fourteen Vessels Taken Over, Nine Being Twin-Screw Steamers—The Present Purchase Simply the Nucleus for a Magnificent Fleet.

MONTREAL, Feb. 23.—Sir Thomas Shaughnessy made the announcement to-day that the Canadian Pacific Railway Company had acquired fourteen steamers of the Elder-Dempster fleet, and that in all probability the arrangements will be so far completed that the company will be able to take over the fleet and to run the vessels as their own ocean liners when the St. Lawrence navigation opens in the spring.

The completion of this transaction will involve a change which practically amounts to a revolution in the Anglo-Canadian transatlantic steamship trade. While the introduction of this new railway factor in to the steamship business introduces no new competitive organization there is little doubt that the basis upon which the traffic is distributed and collected will undergo a radical change.

The enormous volume of traffic which the Canadian Pacific gathers within its widespread tentacles within the network of its transcontinental railway and Oriental steamship service will now be concentrated within its own grasp, instead of being scattered among the various regular ocean lines that ply between Canada and Great Britain; and Sir William Van Horne's dream of a man being able to buy a little ticket at Liverpool which will carry him without further ceremony to Yokohama and Hong Kong will be fulfilled.

The transatlantic factor was the one theory needed to give effect to its full logical significance to the policy which the construction of the transcontinental system with its Oriental adjunct involved.

The service itself, Sir Thomas Shaughnessy said, would be both passenger and freight, and the transaction has been completed entirely without regard to the question of a Government subsidy.

"Among the other details which have yet to be arranged," said Sir Thomas "is that of remuneration by the Government for the carrying of the mails, which comes within the scope of the operations of the passenger steamers.

"Five steamers of the fleet," Sir Thomas added, "will be devoted to passengers and cold storage, the passenger boats being the Lake Manitoba, the Lake Champlain, the Lake Erie, the Montfort, and the Montague, the Montfort, the Montague and the Lake Erie are equipped for cold storage, as are also the freight steamers Monterey and Montcalm, which are constructed so that they can be adapted for the passenger service should such become necessary.

The average speed of the vessels constituting the fleet is understood to be about fifteen knots, and the tonnage ranges from about 5,500 to nearly 9,000.

When asked about the price paid for the fleet, Sir Thomas said he would rather that information came from Sir Alfred Jones, the chairman of the Elder-Dempster Company. As will be seen from the subjoined despatch, the price has not been officially disclosed by the London office of the Elder Dempster Company; but the

AMHERST, Feb. 24.—The annual general meeting of Rhodes, Curry & Co. was held in the Parish hall this afternoon, when the report of the directors was received. The business of last year was the largest in the history of the concern, showing a total output of \$2,400,000. A dividend of 12 per cent, was declared. The old board of directors were re-appointed. Orders amounting to over \$1,750,000 were booked up to the first of January.
