Local Team Wins Final Game 4-3 But Loses Round By Total Score Of 10-7

Packing plenty of sting when scoring opportunities presented themselves, Milton Hornets last night entered the Central Section finals of the intermediate hockey playdowns when they eliminated the local Abbies by a round score of 10-7 in the total goals home and home series.

Beaten 4-3 last night by a desperate Abegweit team Milton nevertheless skated to their well-deserved win by their 7-3 victory scored on Milton ice last Friday.

Pusie Plans To Quit Hockey "For Good"

CHAMBLY BASIN, Que., Feb. 14.—(CP)—A disgruntled Jean Pusie thrust out his lantern jaw today, albeit with only half the usual spirit, and flared with the news he intended to pack up all his troubles in his old skis and quit hockey "for good."

Of course, that is liable to bring a smile, smile, to the faces of those who have read, heard about and seen the colorful French-Canadian firecracker. But taken though it must be with a slight up-tilt of the eyebrow, the hope on Pusie's retirement comes from Monsieur Pusie himself.

"Pusie is ver-e-e discouraged," he claims today, "for a sorrowing thought, that sounded not in the least as if they should be associated with hockey's usually exuberant life of the crowd. Pusie is disgruntled in the fact he has not heard a word from the management of St. Louis Flyers since he wired he would rejoin the American Association Club after a few "financial incidentals" were straightened out.

Receives No Word

It is more than a week now since the 300-pound French-Canadian "Jumper" the Flyers at Wichita, Kansas, and hauled to his home in this town 20 miles south of Montreal. Pusie quit the team after an ice melee which landed him in jail and brought a \$450 fine on charges of assaulting a fan.

"Pusie will not go back this year, I guess. For a moment he hesitated, then reconsidered: I guess Pusie is through with hockey for good. Finished. By gosh, 10 years of professional hockey is plenty. Since 18 years of age... when I start with Canadiens."

There was a gentle reminder that athletes often, before a forecast retirement, had had it stick right away.

"But yes, you are right, my friend. A man can change his mind. It is not what you would call only the woman's prerogative, eh? But no, Pusie says he will quit for good. You can say that Pusie is through and will get a job. Not here in Chambly but in Montreal. The Pusie family will move to Montreal in a short while."

"That last undoubtedly will bring mingled joy and regret to the good neighbors in Chambly, where there are many who would like to see Pusie, 10 years of professional hockey is plenty. Since 18 years of age... when I start with Canadiens."

There was only one penalty during the session that going to Lund of the Abbies.

Continually throwing five man attacks against a solid checking Milton team Abbies had a big edge in the second period but the best they could do was count twice although missing innumerable other chances. With nearly three quarters of the session gone Abbies struck within 20 seconds for their two twine-twisters. Batting inside the Milton line and causing many goal mouth scrambles Pete Weir finally beat the Hornets goalie from about ten feet out. Right after the next face-off Chipman worked his way in close for the third Abbie goal of the evening a goal that just out the Milton lead in half.

Continuing their gangling tactics as the final session got underway Abbies counted after five minutes of play as Pete Weir fed Chipman a pass at the edge of the crease with the latter giving the goalie not a chance in the world. Sensing a victory the locals kept up their desperate drive but the stout Milton defence failed to budge.

With only three minutes to go Peters, Hornets forward finally accounted for the goal that meant the finals for his team. Cruising around his own line Peters suddenly jumped after a loose puck at centre ice, skating fast over the Abbie line he was crowded into a corner but his low, accurate shot slipped under the falling body of the Abbie goalie who went down in an attempt to save. In desperation Abbies pulled their goalie out to place six forwards on the ice but it was of no avail. Hornets kept turning them back and finally Andrew as his teammates surged into Abbies territory shot the disc into an open net after Johnny Kelly had made one save on a low, hard drive.

Bauer Gives Bruins 2-1 Victory Over Red Wings

BOSTON, Feb. 14.—(CP)—Bobby Bauer of Boston's "Sauerkraut Line" plugged home two last-period goals in less than two minutes tonight to pull Bruins up from behind and give them a 2-1 win over Detroit Red Wings, who have yet to beat the leaders since the start of the National Hockey League season.

Bauer thus ruined one of the finest goal-tending performances ever given by Tiny Thompson, his former Bruins teammate, before a frenzied crowd of 14,000 at the Boston Garden.

The triumph increased the Bruins' lead to five games over the idle New York Rangers. Bauer, a tiny right winger, was fed passes by Eddie Shore for both his goals.

Those tallies came late in the third period, while the Bruins were trailing as a result of Hee Klirea's goal early in the second period as soon as they fell behind, the home forces threw all of their might at Thompson, but he performed in sensational fashion to hold them in check.

Seventeen shots were fired at Tiny during the wild third period before Bauer, who hadn't had a close try previously, laced a 10-footer into the Detroit net. As if inspired by that success, Bobby then swooped in from the left boards to slap home the winning tally.

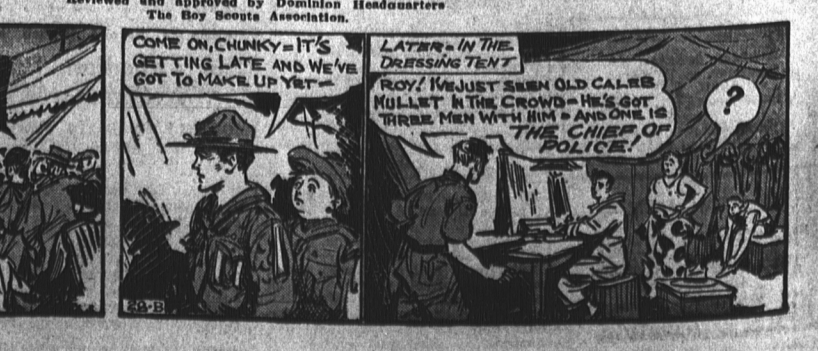
