PRIVATE McLEOD GRADUATES.—One of the more recent graduates of the Marine Corps Institute says a Washington Exchange is Private First Class Earl T. MacLeod of the Business School. Private MacLeod is a Canadian by birth his parents living at Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island. In the early part of 1919 he came to the States and was employed in various positions until the summer of 1920. On August 3, 1920 Private MacLeod, having learned of the opportunities which the United States Marine Corps offered, took out his first papers and joined the Marines. He underwent the usual extensive training at Parris Island, South Carolina, going through with 577 company, under the command of Lieutenant Wemple. Later he was transferred to the Sixteenth Company at Quantico, Va. Here he enrolled in the Banking, accounting and banking-law course, receiving his diploma in June. Private MacLeod did his work well, was selected to be instructor and in June was transferred to the Marine Corps Institute in Washington, D. C. Private MacLeod has also practically finished the course in commercial correspondence, in which he is enrolled at present. He plans to enroll soon in the course of Law for business men.

THE MARKETS

TORONTO, Aug. 8.—Receipts of eggs here yesterday were 1,288 cases as compared with 1,157 cases a week ago and 1,359 cases on the corresponding day last year, a fair trade was done locally and prices were maintained with a firm undertone to the market.

Wholesale jobbing prices were quoted yesterday as follows:

Local trade in maple products remains seasonably inactive with prices nominally unchanged, maple syrup in five of one gallon capacity being quoted at \$1.50, while maple sugar is quoted at 15c, to 17c, per pound according to quality.

In the market for new crop potatoes trade is just beginning to open up and prices are increasingly more firm, having scored an advance of 25c, to 35c, per bag of 80 pounds since the first of the week. There are no car lots coming along supplies dribbling in small lots from day to day. The demand is steady for small quantities to supply immediate needs and good local potatoes are selling readily at \$3 per bag of 80 pounds. The situation will be made easier by receipts of New Brunswick cobbles are soon due to arrive.

Trade in old crop stock in practically finished, stocks on hand being sprouty and generally unfit for shipment.

NEW YORK, Aug. 8.—Eggs irregular. Receipts 16,811 cases. Fresh gathered extra firsts 39c, to 41c; do. firsts 35c, to 37c; State Pennsylvania and nearby western henneries, whites firsts to extra, 47c, to 58c, do. browns, extras, 46c, to 48c, do. gathered browns and mixed colors, firsts to extras 36c, to 44c, refrigerator firsts 35c, to 37c.

TORONTO, Aug. 8.—Easier feeling was again noted in the local live hog market yesterday, trade being light at the prices prevailing yesterday's sales being reported of select weights of cars at \$13 to \$14 per hundred pounds. Sales of thick fats and sows were made a \$10 to \$12 and \$9 to \$9.50 respectively.

Trade in smoked meats remains active, with prices firm, trade in \$ to 10-pound hams having been done at 44c per pound and 18 to 25 pounds hams at 40c. Windsor selected boneless bacon sold at 42c to 50c, and ordinary grades of breakfast bacon at 32c to 35c per pound. Special brands are moving readily at higher figures. The market for trimmed loins of pork was quiet at 32c to 33c per pound while trimmed shoulders brought 29c to 32c.

The market for hard remaining firm, Canadian pure leaf grades in tierces being quoted at 18c, and half a cent higher in tubs and pails.

Receipts of provisions here yesterday were 5 barrels of pork, 33 packages of meat and 2 boxes of hams and bacon.
