tion against certain abdominal conditions.

A pain in the abdomen is generally blamed upon something which has been eaten, and believing this to be true, a purge is usually taken to get rid of the food which is supposed to be responsible for the trouble. However, pain in the abdomen is not by any means always due to such a simple cause. It may be caused by inflammation of one or other of the abdominal organs, such as the appendix. The pain may also be due to a ruptured ulcer of the stomach.

In such cases, rest of the part is imperative. The use of laxatives breaks down the protection set up by nature. The movements of the intestine are again set up and may cause the inflamed appendix to rupture, which results in a peritonitis.

Many persons with abdominal pain have taken laxative without serious results. However, it is true also that many lives are lost each year because laxatives are used to relieve abdominal pains.

It is not our desire to cause alarm, but we feel that it is our responsibility to inform the public that appendicitis is responsible for several hundred of deaths in our country each year. These deaths occur at all ages, many of them being those of children, and the number is not decreasing, but is rather in the increase. The reason for this is that abdominal pain is not regarded seriously and that when it does occur a dose of some laxative, such as castor oil, is thoughtlessly given.
