WHAT CANADA IS DOING FOR THE HUNTING INDIANS

In Canada, under the constitution, which is the British North America Act of 1867, all the Indians are wards of the Federal Government and Indian administration is conducted by a Federal Department—the Department of Indian Affairs.
The Indian population is approximately 112,000, spread fairly evenly across the Dominion and located on reserves as in the United States.
About 50,000 are dependent, in whole or in part, upon hunting and fishing for their livelihood. As might be expected, the hunting and fishing Indians are those who inhabit the less settled, northern, and outlying regions. They are the more primitive Indians in whom Indian blood still predominates who continue to follow the Indian mode of life and who in consequence are more in need of Government supervision than the tribes who inhabit the more organized districts and have intermarried with whites and are more advanced.
Under the British North America Act, the game and fish belong to the Provinces, except, of course, in the few remaining Federal Territories. The problems that arise therefore, fall into two jurisdictions—Federal, over the Indians, and Provincial, over the game and fish. Difficulties are overcome by conference and agreement between the Federal and Provincial authorities.
In some parts of the Dominion Indians possess special hunting and fishing privileges, pursuant to treaties made with the tribes by the Crown.
Of late years the affairs of the hunting and fishing Indians have become a matter of grave concern to the department. Hunting and fishing are the aboriginal vocations of the primitive Indians. By immemorial usage the Indians were conservationists and still may be henceforward if protected. On the other hand, if whites are allowed to deplete Indian hunting grounds, the Indians themselves will naturally take all they can, while they can, and there is grave danger that such a situation may bring about intensive competition between whites and Indians, ending in the virtual extermination of valuable species. 4 of these constituencies by comfortable majorities. The belief in political circles at Ottawa however is that the Government cannot hope to carry either Selkirk or Humboldt, both of which constituencies are likely to return Socialist candidates. Stanstead should be safe for the Government, its political record having been strongly Liberal over a considerable period of years. The results taken as a whole should be instructive as indicating the attitude of the electorate toward the King Government and its political record since the beginning of the war. By and large it seems a safe guess that the outcome will scotch Mr. King's general election project for the duration.
