PONTIFICAL HIGH MASS.—The Pontifical High Mass of requiem which will be celebrated this morning in the Pro-Cathedral for the late Pope will begin at nine o'clock.

Addresses will be delivered by His Lordship Bishop O'Leary, Sir Louis Davies, Sir W. W. Sullivan, Premier Mathieson and Judge Hazzard.

AT VALCARTIER CAMP

VALCARTIER, Aug. 26.—To-day has witnessed the arrival of thousands of new troops, and more than the 20,000 are under canvas here to-night.

Night and day the work goes on without a halt and without a hitch. Land covered with bushes to-night will be a city street to-morrow, for Valcartier is becoming a greater city as the hours pass.

To-night the streets are a crush of moving men, with "everybody keeping to the right." New stores opened in camp to-day were cleaned out in a twinkling. The task of coping with the wants of close on 20,000 men will be a tremendous one for those who have Government permits to dispense those little side-lines of delicacies so dear to the soldier's heart. But none will pay more than the ordinary price. A rigid government regulation has seen to that. In a day or so now the camp will be up to full strength, but the "weeding out" process has already begun. The men are standing this, the acid test admirably. Inoculation as a preventive of typhoid has commenced and half the camp is nursing sore arms to-night.

Five other reels, comedy and drama, made up an exceptionally good and well selected programme. The Firemen's Tournament will be shown again tonight for the last time, together with new reels.

WHAT MUST BE FEARED

LONDON, Aug. 26.—Military correspondent Times says: "We and the Dutch have no doubt that annihilation of all north ports from the Straits of Dover to Emden will follow a German success in war—a success which would only be preliminary to the concentration of all German efforts upon the subjugation of England."

AUSTRIANS LOSES

LONDON, Aug. 26.—A despatch from Paris to Reuters says the losses of Austrians in the Battle of Drina continues to grow, according to telegrams from Nish. The latest wire is that out of 200,000 Austrians engaged, 15,000 were killed, 200,000 wounded, and 15,000 made prisoners; 75 guns were captured.

ALLIES CONFIDENT

PARIS, Aug. 26.—The French War Office was silent this morning. No official announcement has been issued. Unofficial military opinion along the French-Belgian frontier continues confident. A quiet confidence exists in Paris that the allies will hold off the German attack and take the offensive when the proper hour arrives.

MET THE FULL SHOCK.

The Echo de Paris says: "We can add some details of the official news. We are assured that an officer of General Joffre's staff brought a surmised report at the close of the day to the Ministerial Council. "For a short time our troops, tirailleurs and Zouaves, were masters west of Meuse, the Germans giving way. Then they hurled the Guards' brigade against our attack, and despite the immense losses inflicted upon the enemy, our Africans (mostly Senegals, Algerians and Moroccans) were forced to retire under orders from headquarters. They met the full shock of the German army, which has thrown all its forces upon Belgium."

KAISER'S MESSAGE TO KING OF WURTEMBERG

BERLIN, via London, wireless, Aug. 25.—After advance of German armies from Strassburg across the French frontier taking Lunburg, France, Monday, the Kaiser sent the following telegram to the King of Wurtemberg: "With God's gracious assistance Duke Albrecht and his splendid army have gained; join with us in thanking the Almighty. I have bestowed on Albrecht the iron cross of the first and second class."

THE ROYAL BANK GIVES \$50,000

(Canadian Press.)
MONTREAL, August 26.—The Royal Bank of Canada gives \$50,000 to the patriotic fund.

GERMANS LEAVE BRUSSELS

LONDON, Aug. 26.—A despatch to the Chronicle from Antwerp says that the German troops are reported to have departed from Brussels and that the Belgians expect to recapture the city immediately.

BATTLE RAGING

LONDON, Aug. 26.—A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from Paris says that the French War Office issued the following: "In Lorraine the allies armies have taken up a combined offensive movement and battle recommenced yesterday and is still raging at time this bulletin is issued."

A FRENCH VICTORY

A despatch to Reuters from Ghent says: "A violent combat raged at Journal, Monday, the cannonade did not cease until ten next morning. Workmen relate that the Germans were driven back and that the French flag was flying at Orrior, in Eastern Flanders."

HORSE NOTES

The horse races at New Annan today promise to be of considerable interest. A special train leaves Charlottetown at 8.45 o'clock.

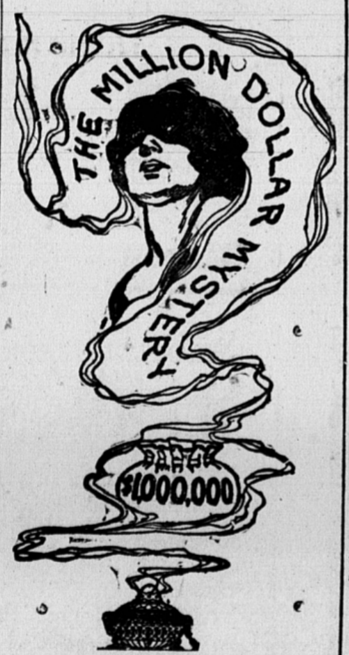
