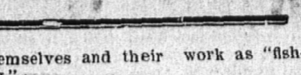

Dr. MacKinnon is now "ONE OF THE BUNCH"

Patience and persistency in gaining recruits for the new Nova Scotia Battalion was the keynote of the advice given by Rev. Principal MacKinnon, Chaplain of the 219th, to the recruiting officers and a company of forty-five men of the 86th at the luncheon yesterday in the rooms of the Khaki Club, Kuke and Granville Streets.

Dr. MacKinnon was most happy and informal in his remarks, going so far as to say, in the speech of the streets, "I am grateful that I am now one of the bunch."

The reference was to his commission in the 219th Battalion as Chaplain beyond the rank of Captain. Beginning his remarks he said:—

"Fellow-Soldiers: I never belonged to a secret society, but I understand that in one of them a goat is ridden. On the present occasion I shall have to be both the rider and the goat, and ride my own goat. Sitting yesterday on the veranda of my home at the North West Arm, I observed waves coming up the inlet, and I knew that there must be some disturbance in the sea beyond the Arm. While I was sitting musing on the fact, I was called to the phone and asked if I were willing to accept a commission as Chaplain in the 219th Battalion. Thus I know that there must be going on some significant disturbance in our country's life. I responded through the phone that I would be glad actively to be in the cause. And here I am, and let me say to you, fellow-soldiers, I am grateful to be one of the bunch."

An interesting and striking simile was used by Dr. MacKinnon, which made a deep impression on the officers and men of the ranks who heard him. Those who were actively trying to gain new recruits should regard themselves and their work as "fishing."

"You can go out to a stream with a rod, line and hook," he said, "and immediately catch a sucker or minnow with the bare hook. But if you want to catch a walley trout, you must temptingly bait the hook, patiently wait and play for the trout. So in your recruiting efforts, if you want to land your man you must play for him patiently, and temptingly. You will run across men in the streets who will hedge and hold back, but be patient, be persistent with them, come back again at them; and, let me tell you, those very men for whom you fished hardest before landing them will be the most grateful to you of all those you brought into the recruiting office to enlist in the service of their country."

Concluding, Dr. MacKinnon declared with emphasis:—

"You are doing more than you dream of. You have got things going. You are doing big things. Keep the good work up. You may not realize what effective work you are doing. But here is an instance. The staff of the Presbyterian College, Halifax, comprises four professors. Two of these have joined the 219th Battalion. Professor H. A. Kent, who will be second in command of the Halifax company, and myself as chaplain. Let this encourage you to bring in recruits from all walks of life."

Dr. MacKinnon was introduced by Lieutenant Wylie, one of the recruiting officers of the 86th. His associate, Lieutenant Roper, also was present. An interesting episode while the luncheon was going on was the arrival of eight pipers, who played from the recruiting office at Barrington Street to the Khaki Club. On arrival the bugler with them sounded outside the entrance the "Cook house call," which delighted the men at the tables.

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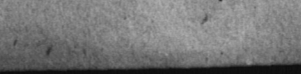
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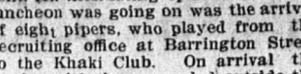
