In Ol' Virginia

HE RECEIVED THE FIRST HONORARY DEGREE FROM WILLIAM AND MARY COLLEGE, AT WILLIAMSBURG, VA., IN 1779. IT TOOK HIM THREE DAYS TRAVELING BY STAGE COACH AND CANAL BOAT TO MAKE THE TRIP FROM PHILADELPHIA TO THE SCHOOL.

While the location of the first race track in the United States may not be a highly important item in history (and while it may not matter a great deal to the fellow who tries to out-guess the bangtalls) it is, however, a question which is brought up when a visiting sports writer stops off at Richmond, Va.

Horse racing was, undoubtedly, both in Virginia. The exact site of the first track seems a little in doubt, but, just outside of Williamsburg, there is an iron sign marking The Colonial Quarter. Now it is little more than a seldom used lane, but back in colonial days it was used as a

race course. There are other places near Richmond where the distinction of the first track is claimed, but inquiry fails to uncover convincing proof to support such claims.

Virginia was surely the home of the first horse racing in this State. Yet that sport is illegal in Virginia now. So the horse lovers of the section that gave this country the sport must be content with the thrill which goes with horse shows and hunt club meetings where gentlemen riders vie for honors in steeplechases and flat races. Such is progress.

In another vein we discovered that Benjamin Franklin probably was the first man in this country ever to be

given an honorary degree. Franklin received this honor at William and Mary's College in Williamsburg. It took him three days to make the trip from Philadelphia, traveling by stage coach and boat, to receive that sheepskin. There is no record of the return trip but it is likely that it took an equal time, or longer, to get back to his job.

However, the main subject at hand concerns racing and, while many States lack the sport of kings it does seem rather unkind that the sport is not legal in the State where it was born — Virginia.

Buster Keaton battles with rum runners, navigates a burning and deserted ship through a storm, wrecks a theatre and a night club, and indulges in other strenuous and hilarious adventures in his latest Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer comedy, "Spite Marriage," now playing at the Prince Edward Theatre.

It's the story of a tailor who poses as a millionaire, marries a beautiful actress and then is utterly submerged in comical griefs, woes, mishaps and adventures. Most of the big laughs come through Buster's participation in such thrills as a battle at sea, swinging head downward from the mast of a ship in a storm and such details.

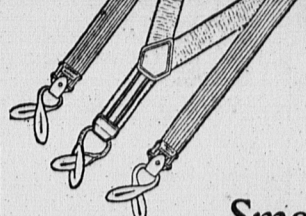

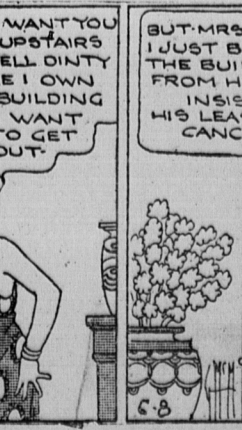
