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VIOLENCE CONTINUES IN GERMANY

BERLIN, Aug. 8.—(A.P.)—Violence continued over night in Germany's political animosities. Special Commissioner Diels on arrival at Koenigsberg to investigate the situation there, found that Kurt Kotzan, Reichsbanner leader at Loetzen, had been shot dead in a street after an altercation with a group of Adolf Hitler's National Socialists while on the way home from his office.

The windows of six Berlin branches of the Scherl Company, publisher of the Lokal Anzeiger and other Nationalist newspapers, were smashed by rocks wrapped in copies of the Communist paper, Rote Fahne. At Rathbor a window in the plant of a Communist paper was shattered by the explosion of a hand grenade. A bomb exploded in shrubbery facing the main railroad station at Altona, but caused no damage.

Meanwhile the groundwork was laid for negotiations aimed at bringing about participation in the government of Adolf Hitler, leader of the turbulent National Socialists.

Hitler's headquarters in Munich made a great secret about where he was over the week-end, but political Berlin was convinced that he was awaiting an opportunity to tell General Kurt Von Schleicher, the real power in the present ministry, what price the government must pay for his support.

The latest suggestion in political circles is that Hitler will be brought into the ministry with the post of Vice-Chancellor without portfolio and that his leading lieutenants—Hermann Goerring, Gregor Strasser and Dr. Wilhelm Frick—will get Cabinet positions.

It is a week now since the Reichstag elections but the continued outbursts of bombings and other forms of violence are proof that political passions have not cooled. From every side the government has been urged to end the virtual civil war. The Nazis clamor for suppression of all Communists; the Socialists and Communists urge that Hitler's storm troops be outlawed; and moderates of various camps demand drastic measures against all offenders.

But the government—with a new emergency decree providing severe penalties for persons involved in disorders all drawn up and ready for publication—still hesitated to-night, hoping that such leaders as Hitler would be able to check their followers.

At Breslau Ernst Eckstein, head of the Socialist labor party, was flung out of bed yesterday by a bomb thrown from a speeding automobile. The room was wrecked but he was not hurt. He blamed the Nazis. Extensive damage was done in a street lined with workmen's houses in Brunswick when a charge of dynamite was set off.

BERLIN, Aug. 9.—Deaths, injuries and further window smashing were reported overnight as Germany's political violence continued.

In the Berlin suburb of Lietzenberg a man wanted by police barricaded himself in his home and fired wildly, wounding two women passersby, finally he killed his wife and himself when the police were about to use tear-gas.

Seven civilians and three policemen were wounded by bullets in an affray following a rifle club festival at Froendenberg, Westphalia.
