THE CAPITAL OF THE WEST. Gillian Returns from Dorchester—Lodged in Prince County Jail—New Trial in November.

THE prisoner George Gillian, sentenced to the penitentiary in the Supreme Court held in Summerside in June last, convicted of manslaughter was removed from Dorchester penitentiary on Saturday where he has since been confined, and replaced in Prince County jail, Summerside. It will be remembered that through the effort of Neil McQuarrie, K. C., counsel for the prisoner before the Court of Appeal of Charlottetown, this conviction was quashed on the ground of some evidence being improperly admitted at the trial, and a new trial was ordered. Gillian on the way over was in charge of Deputy Sheriff Fred. Wright and Constable Patrick Daly. He was allowed freedom about the steamer Northumberland and without shackles was conveyed by carriage from the wharf to the jail there to await trial in November next.
