The walls were painted deep ivory; there were flowers in the windows, curtained by unbleached factory cotton, bordered with checked ginghams; best of all a couch in the corner with cushions of the cotton dyed a pretty blue. Mystery Mansions Deserted for Years

UNKNOWN OWNER THE LONELY MAN AT THE LODGE (By Dominion News Service) LONDON, Sept. 10.—The attention of the local authorities at Southall, Middlesex, has been called to two deserted houses, which for the past 30 years have been standing empty and are fast falling into disrepair. The first is known as Norwood House and stands near Norwood Green, about two miles from Ealing. The house has for years remained a mystery to neighboring residents. The only human being who is ever seen in its grounds is a man who is living a hermit's existence in the dilapidated lodge attached. Norwood House contains 25 rooms and has many subterranean passages. Many years ago it was owned by a foreigner named Rush, who kept hunters and polo ponies in the spacious stables, as well as a large collection of strange birds in a big aviary. After his death it was, so far as can be ascertained, bought by a Mr. Taylor, who died many years ago and who never lived there. Unknown Rent Collector The present tenant of the lodge

is an aged man, Mr. A. Steadman. "I rented the lodge from someone years ago, and have lived here alone since then," he stated. "I don't know who owns the place, and I don't even know who collects my rent. At long intervals a man whose name I do not know calls for it. He is very irregular in his visits. I have been told that when Mr. Taylor died the property was left to his family, but there was a feud over a beautiful woman who visited here many years ago and the place has never been occupied since. "Once or twice only have I been inside, and then it was when my sons have paid me a visit. I took them into the house to show them what it looked like. Desolate and deserted, with no sign of habitation, the house backs on to a private park, along the borders of which are built great hot-houses, containing nothing but weeds. "It is not safe to enter them, as the glass roofs will fall in at the slightest movements," said Mr. Steadman. For months Mr. Steadman not see a soul. 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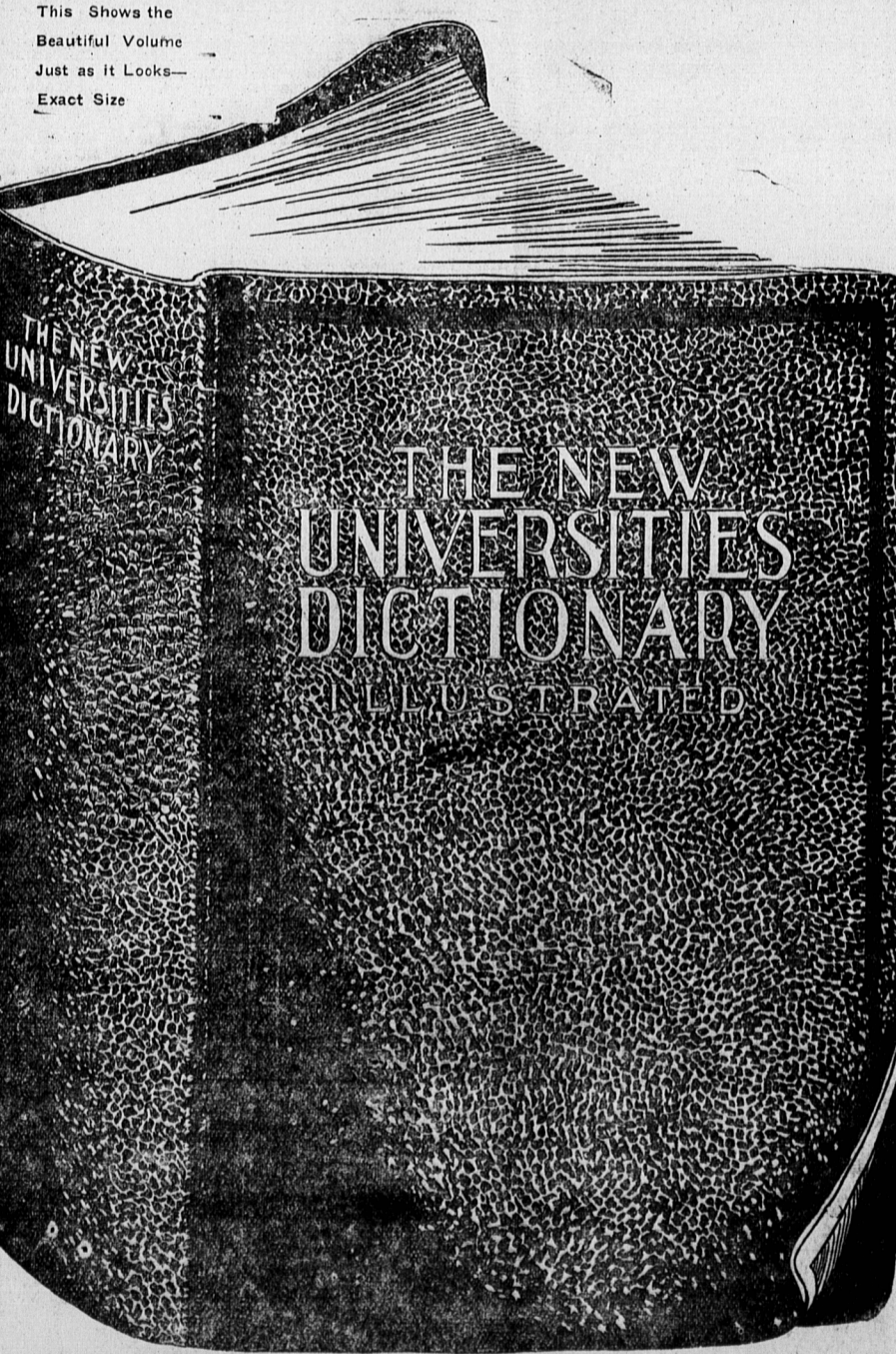
