THE MARKETS.

There was a large attendance at the market yesterday and produce was more plentiful than for some weeks past.

A large quantity of fowl and chickens was in which sold from 40c to 80c a pair. A few geese were in which sold at 75c each.

Butter brought from 23.25c per lb. There was a slight decrease in the price of eggs which sold at 22c per dozen.

Apples were quite plentiful and sold from 10 to 25c per peck.

There was a good quantity of hay and oats brought in which sold from 75 to 85c per cwt. and 40 to 50c per bus respectively.

Potatoes remain at 25-30c per bus. The price of pork keeps about the same from 64 to 68c per lb.
