Unrestricted submarine warfare in 1941 constituted a defiance—an act of aggression—against that historic American policy.

It is now clear that Hitler has begun his campaign to control the seas by ruthless force and by wiping out every vestige of international law and humanity.

His intention has been made clear. The American people can have no further illusions about it.

No tender whisperings of appeasers that Hitler is not interested in the western hemisphere, no soporific hushes that a wide ocean protects us from him—can long delude us.

Because of these episodes, because of the movements and operations of German warships, and because of the constant reports that the present government of Germany has no respect for treaties or for international law, that it has no decent attitude toward neutral nations or human life—we must have music and we must have abstract theories but with cruel, relentless facts.

This attack on the Greer was no localized military operation in the North Atlantic. This was no mere episode in a struggle between two nations. This was one determined step towards creating a permanent world system based on force, terror and murder.

And I am sure that even now the Nazis are waiting to see whether the United States will by silence give them the green light to go ahead on this path of destruction.

The Nazi danger to our western world has long ceased to be a mere possibility. The danger is here now—not only from a military enemy but from an enemy of all law, all liberty, all morality, all religion.

There has now come a time when you and I must see the cold inexorable necessity of saving to these inhuman, unrestrained seekers of world conquest and permanent world domination by the sword.

Normal practices of diplomacy—note writing—are of no possible use in dealing with international outlaws who sink our ships and kill our citizens.

One peaceful nation after another has met disaster because each refused to look the Nazi danger squarely in the eye until it actually had them by the throat. The United States will not make that fatal mistake.

No act of violence or intimidation will keep us from maintaining intact two bulwarks of defence: first, our line of supply of essential goods; second, the freedom of our shipping on the high seas.

No matter what it takes, no matter what it costs, we will keep open the line of legitimate commerce in these defensive waters.

We have sought no shooting war with Hitler. We do not seek it now. But neither do we want peace so much that we are willing to pay for it by permitting him to attack our naval and merchant ships while they are on legitimate business.

I assume that the German leaders are not deeply concerned by what we Americans say or publish about them. We cannot bring about the downfall of Nazism by the use of long-range invective.

But when you see a rattlesnake poised to strike, you do not wait until he has struck before you crush him.

These Nazi submarines and raiders are the rattlesnakes of the Atlantic. They are a menace to the free pathways of the high seas. They are a challenge to our sovereignty. They hammer at our most precious rights when they attack our ships.

Do not let us split hairs. Let us not say "We will only defend ourselves if the torpedo succeeds in sinking them." Let us maintain the protection of which is necessary for American defence, they do so at their own peril.

That is my obvious duty in this crisis. That is the clear right of this sovereign nation. That is the only step possible, if we would keep light the wall of defence which we are pledged to maintain around this western hemisphere.

I could multiply instances. To be ultimately successful in world mastery, Hitler knows that he must get control of the sea. He must first destroy the bridge of ships which we are building across the Atlantic, over which we shall continue to roll the impediments of war to help destroy him and all his works in the end. He must wipe out our patrol on sea and in the air. He must silence the British navy.

It must be explained again and again to people who like to think of the United States navy as an invincible protection that this can be true only if the British navy survives. That is simple arithmetic.

For if the world outside the Americas falls under Axis domination, the shipbuilding facilities which the Axis powers would then possess in all of Europe, in the British Isles, and in the Far East would be much greater than all the shipbuilding facilities and potentialities of all the Americas—not only greater, but two or three times greater. Even if the United States threw all its resources into such a situation, seeking to double and even redouble the size of our navy, the Axis powers, in control of the rest of the world, would have the man-power and the physical resources to outbuild us several times over.

No Time for Romantic Notions

It is time for all Americans of all the Americas to stop being deluded by the romantic notion that the Americas can go on living happily and peacefully in a Nazi-dominated world.

Generation after generation, America has battled for the general policy of the freedom of the seas. That policy is a very simple one—but a basic, fundamental one. It means that no nation has the right to make the broad oceans of the world at great distances from the actual theatre of land war unsafe for the commerce of others.

That has been our policy, proved time and time again, in all our history.
