Hobson Stories.

'Is Lieutenant Hobson, by his gallant deed, likely to add a word to the nautical portion of the English language? It looks like it,' said the London Telegraph recently.

For example, a river steamer, one of the grimmest and most tumble-down of the many dilapidated craft of the kind that plow the silent highway, nearly collided with a barge at London Bridge yesterday afternoon. The skipper used strong language to the bargee; but to his taunts the latter bellowed, 'Better take that old tub out to sea and Hobsonize her.'

The retort was greeted with a burst of appreciative and sympathetic laughter by the passengers on board the vessel thus characterized.

'Lieutenant Hobson's deed of bravery on the Merrimac,' writes an English army officer, 'may remind us of an English boy of the same name—Hobson—born at Benchurch, Isle of Wight, whose drunken father apprenticed him to the village tailor, who used him cruelly. That was during the war between France and England.

'One day news came that the English fleet was in the offing. Young Hobson ran down a back lane to the shore, showed off in the first rowboat he found handy, pulled for the foremost vessel, and there and then enlisted in what proved to be the Admirals' own ship. Out to sea they sighted the enemy.

'The two fleets engaged in the channel, and the Admiral's ship was locked yardarm to yardarm with the leading ship of the French fleet.

'While the fight raged, the lad Hobson asked an able seaman, 'What are we trying to do?'

'Do you see that flag up there?' pointing to the Franchman's masthead. 'Yes,' said the boy.

'Well, we want to get that down,' said the man.

'Presently the English crew raised a mighty shout of exultation, and the French saw that their flag was gone. Instantly the order to board was obeyed, and after a short resistance, the French ship surrendered.

'Who saw the French flag shot away?'

'Nobody could answer till a little figure was seen sliding down the shrouds with something wrapped around his arm. It was young Hobson.

'Unobserved, he had crossed the yard from his own to the enemy's masthead, and in the heat of the action had cut the Frenchman's flag from its balyards and taken possession of it.

'The boy was promoted to the quarter deck, and by continued gallantry, he rose, step by step, till he became Admiral Hobson.'

DEATH OF AN ISLANDER

(Norwich, Conn., Post, Sept. 30.)

Daniel Shaw died Tuesday at his home, No 69 Twelfth street, at the age of 71 after an illness of 10 days, with pneumonia. He was born in Prince Edward Island, December 25, 1827.

In 1853 he came to Greenville from Wareham, Mass., and entered the employ of the Mowry Machine Company. Upon the breaking out of the Civil War he enlisted in Company A, Eighth regiment Connecticut infantry, where he served three years. He was discharged at Harper's Ferry, Va., on the 27th day of June 1865. On his return to Norwich he re-entered the employ of the Mowry Machine Company and remained with them until the company went out of business. He entered the employ of the Norwich Bleaching, Dyeing and printing company, 19 years ago and worked there until his death. The deceased was a member of Sedgewick Post, No 1, G. A. R., and for 39 years was a member of the Third Baptist church.

Mr. Shaw was thrice married. His first wife was Abbie Jane Maples, a sister of Frank T. Maples, of this city. Her sad demise came soon after their marriage and several years afterwards he was wedded to Kate Kendall, a sister of the late Increase W. Carpenter. Two children were born to them, Charles, of Passaic, N. J., and Joseph, of Brooklyn, N. Y., who survive their father. Twenty seven years ago he married Caroline, a daughter of England, who with seven children, Mrs. John Eaton of Groton, John William, Harold and George of Norwich, and Misses Annie and Mamie survive him. He is also survived by four brothers, Neal Shaw, of Peabody, Mass., Alexander and John Shaw, and Mrs. William Hudson, of Prince Edward Island and Edwin C. Shaw, of Philadelphia.

Mr. Shaw was a man of fine nature, who loved his home and family and found the greatest pleasure in his home circle. As a soldier he was fearless and brave and as a friend he was prized highly. His life was an exemplary one and he leaves a grief-stricken family and legion of friends.

Funeral services will be held at the Third Baptist Church at 2 o'clock this afternoon. Sedgewick Post will meet at their headquarters at 1 o'clock to attend the funeral.
