**ORATORICAL
CONTEST AT
FREELAND**

**Much Interest Taken
by Large Audience.**

The Oratorical elimination contest
for the pupils of Freeland School was
held in Freeland Hall on Thursday
evening, March 14th, at the hour of
7.30 p. m.

The hall was well filled and all
through the programme the atten-
tion of the audience was exception-
ally good.

The seven contestants were very
calm and collected as they watched
the audience, and more especially
that part of the audience who ap-
peared in "Judicial Robes."

The contest opened with a chorus
e. g. O! Canada! This was fol-
lowed by an address delivered by H.
Lloyd Henderson, the teacher of the
pupils concerned. Mr. Henderson
in very clear terms dealt with the
subject of International Oratorical
Contests, and also explained about
the eligibility of contestants and the
prize list.

and all were quite satisfied as to

Miss Kathleen Henderson the first
speaker addressed the eager assem-
bly, on "The League of Nations," and
in the course of her address brought
out many interesting facts concern-
ing the work of the International In-
stitution.

Miss Ruth MacKay came second on
the list and gave a very intellige-
nt lecture on "A Trip through the Rocky
Mountains from Calgary to Vancou-
ver," laying some emphasis on "The
Great Divide, Three Sisters and The
Tunnels, one of which was the Con-
naught.

Then came Oswald Murphy with
his subject of "Agriculture on Prince
Edward Island." Mr. Murphy dealt
forcefully with Potato and Dairy In-
dustries, giving a full account of the
amount of Potatoes shipped from the
Island this year. He also mentioned
some of the best Dairy farms in The
Garden of The Gulf.

Miss Elizabeth Palmer came fourth,
and with clear articulation gave a
"History of the Fox Industry in our
Fox raising Province." Miss Palmer
also dealt briefly with the care and
feeding of foxes for fur.

Miss Olive Palmer, being fifth, gave
a good address on "Prince Edward
Island," briefly discussing The Com-
parative size and Population, also
Agricultural, Fox and Fishing Indus-
tries.

Next came Milton Palmer. Milton,
as the contestants had before as-
sured him, swayed the unanimous
opinion of both the audience and the
judges. From the very start, one with
sensible hearing ability, could hear a
murmur of his being first on the
prize list. The ease with which his
address on "Canada" was delivered
and the force laid on several Patri-
otic points in his address was certain-
ly a Credit to the pupils and teach-
er of Freeland. Concluding his Or-
ation the following:

"For not a man dare lift a hand
against the men who brag.

That they were born in Canada be-
neath the British flag."

Milton with a sway of his arm car-
ried the audience "Off their feet," so
to speak.

Lastly Miss Ruth Boyle came with
an address on "The Prairies of The
Canadian West." Miss Boyle deliv-
ered a very instructive speech on the
above and stressed on the difference
in the method of farming in the Pra-
iries and on Prince Edward Island.

Mr. John W. Palmer, who very cap-
ably filled the position of Chairman
Addressed the enthusiastic audience,
Congratulated the Teacher and Com-
petitors, and then called on The Re-
verend D. T. Davies, who was present,
to give some remarks, which he did
in a capable manner. Mr. Davies said
that he knew how difficult it would
be for the Judges to decide the mat-
ter.

Remarks of satisfaction and I
might say surprise were made by Mr.
R. C. Henderson and also by Mrs. W.
J. MacKay.

A vote of thanks was tendered to
the teacher and pupils for the excel-
lent way in which the contest was

**ARRESTED AT
ALLAHABAD**

ALLAHABAD, March 21—Puran
Chandra Joshi, secretary of the Un-
ited Provinces Workers Union, and
Peasants' Party, was arrested at
Allahabad today in the police drive
against agitators. Joshi was study-
ing for his final law examination at
Allahabad University and living at
one of the university hotels. His
room was searched and communist
literature found and seized by the
police.

Arrests also took place in other cit-
ies in the united provinces. At Luck-
now, Chauduri Dharamvir Singh,
nationalist member of the United
Provinces Legislative Council, was
arrested, charged under Section 121
of the Indian penal code, with "wag-
ing war against the King."

fire recently.

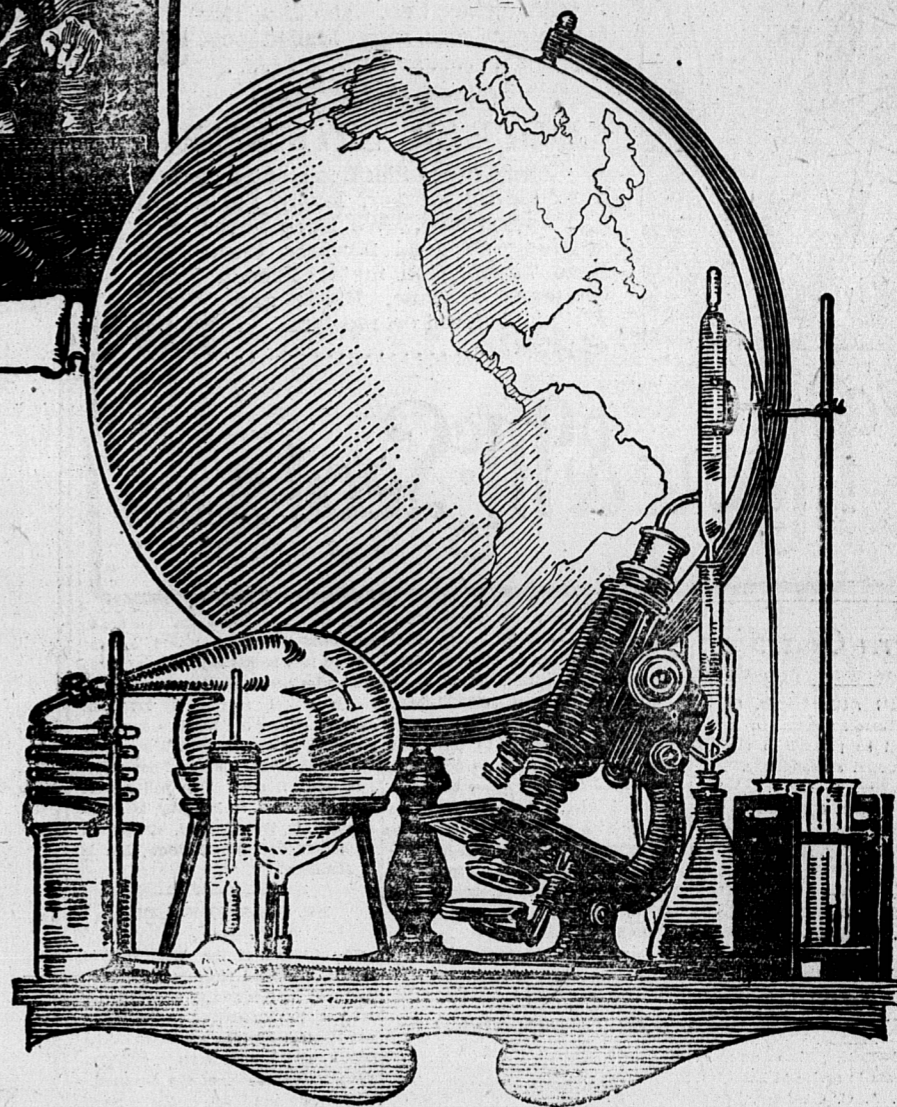
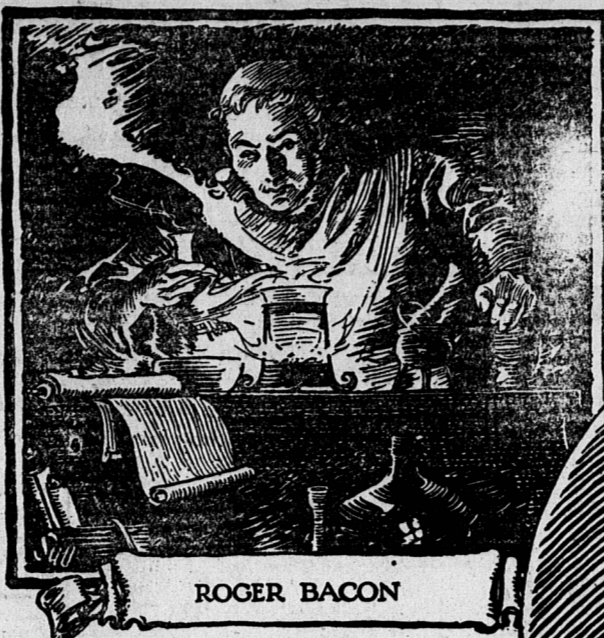
