POTATO PRICES HIGHER ON INCREASED BUYING

CHICAGO, Dec. 22.—The cold wave prevailing prompted buyers of potatoes to take on large supplies, and values in consequence were advanced 5c to 10c per 100 pounds. Offerings were light, receipts running to only 4000. Butter was firm and higher on certain grades and eggs were advanced 2c to 3c on medium-priced lots. Receipts of former were 13,204 tubs and latter 5,083 cases. Poultry ruled strong for live descriptions, while dressed turkeys declined 3c.

PARIS, Dec. 22.—There is practically no unemployment in the great French towns. The total number of persons receiving relief throughout France last week was only 2,604 including 313 in the Seine Department, which takes in Paris. The government recently advertised for over 3,000 laborers, but received not a single response. There has been an overwhelming response however, to calls for positions such as tax collectors, rural postmen and book-keepers.

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Blue Bird Tea BRINGS HAPPINESS

Light Keepers May Be Marooned

OTTAWA, Dec. 22.—The unusual severity of the weather on the Great Lakes is beginning to lead to a fear that some of the light-house keepers on remote stations on Lake Superior may not get off at all before navigation closes. The department had arranged with the tug Reliance which was wrecked a few days ago to do this work. It is now sending the Gray to take its place and it will be a race between the tug and the temperature. It is reported 30 below at Fort William today. The trouble is that the lake navigators keep running until the last possible moment when to do so is to endanger the lives of the crews. Until the wreck of the Reliance the lakes had been very free from mishap this year and it was hoped the season might close without a black mark on the record.

Are Watering Stock To Escape New Taxes

ALBANY, N.Y., Dec. 23.—Apparently as an aftermath of a recent United States Supreme Court decision that stock dividends were not taxable, hundreds of companies are increasing their capitalization by enormous amounts. The Secretary of State's office announced today. The move is thought to be in anticipation of action by Congress to tax surplus or its distribution. The increase in capitalization runs into the millions and it is not uncommon for a company originally capitalized at \$100,000 to increase its capitalization to \$1,000,000, the statement said. The move is not confined to any one particular line of business. Increasing the amount of authorized capital stock enables the corporation to turn over its surplus to its stockholders in the form of stock dividends, the move converting the amount into capital instead of surplus, it was explained.

Mary Miles Minter "Synthetic Star"

NEW YORK, Dec. 23.—The decision of Famous Players not to renew the contract with Mary Miles Minter revived newspaper discussion of that star's part in the Taylor affair in Hollywood, and several of the metropolitan journals discussed all phases of the occurrence. Variety in its current number. "It was stated that Miss Minter's salary under the Famous Players agreement just expiring amounted to \$250,000 a year. Famous Players was the first organization in the picture industry to agitate the point that stars and star salaries were driving the business to ruin and the first to undertake a system of taxation. "But the Minter case was directly to the contrary. Miss Minter got her first momentum toward stardom under the Metro banner. It was with that organization she made her earliest features, such as "Barbara Fritchie" and during her entire time with Metro, was under a direct contract for a maximum of \$25,000. The advertising campaign in her behalf by Famous Players gave her the name of 'the screen's synthetic star'."

Manager Of Chicago Bank Is Arrested

CHICAGO, Dec. 22.—National Bank examiners it was announced this afternoon have discovered a shortage of \$70,000 in the First National Bank of Chicago, the second largest banking institution in the city. Seth Anderson, manager of the bank's clearing department, was arrested on a warrant obtained by R.S. Newhall, cashier of the bank. Mr. Newhall said the bank was fully protected by insurance.

An Attempt To Stop The Garneau Murder Is Still A Mystery

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23.—Tormal notification has been given in a note presented to the state department by Sir Auckland Geddes, British Ambassador, and made public today that the Canadian government has issued instructions to its registrars of shipping by which it is hoped to assist the United States through fraudulent transfer of American vessels to British registry. Under the new instructions, the note set forth, an application to register a vessel in Canada which has been purchased from a citizen of the United States unless supported by a certificate under the seal of the U. S. Shipping Board authorizing such a transfer, "must be forwarded to the competent department of the Canadian government for instructions before any definite steps are taken."

Canadian Youth Given A Home By N. Y. Policeman

NEW YORK, Dec. 21.—Leon Castle, seventeen years old, a Canadian boy from Edmonton, Alta., who walked into a police station here last night, and requested food and shelter, today has a home. Patrolman John E. Musgrave, of the East sixty-seventh street station, was so impressed with the manners and appearance of the lad when he was brought into court this morning that he offered to take Castle to live with him temporarily. A charge of vagrancy was dismissed. Patrolman Musgrave lives at 1838 Barnes avenue, the Bronx and is the father of two children. He offered to give Castle a home until he could find employment and support himself.
