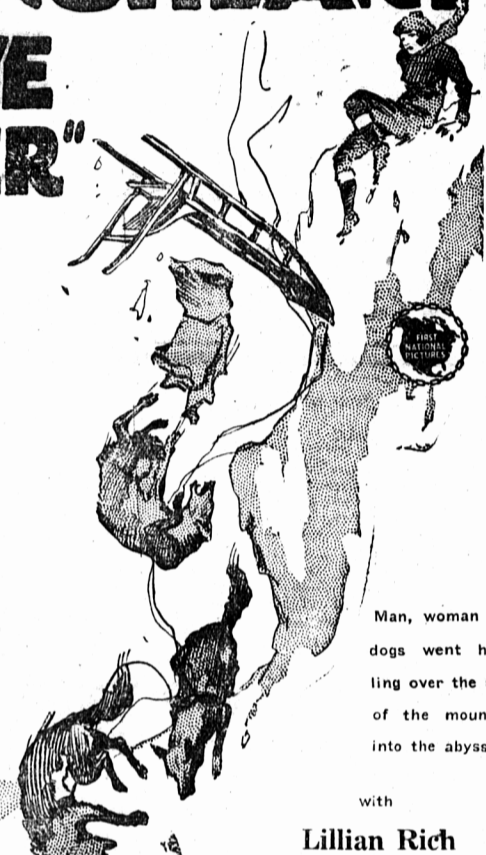

Teachers' Conference at Victoria, B. C.

SPECIAL TRAIN FROM TORONTO VIA CANADIAN NATIONAL RAILWAYS

Maritime Province teachers will do well to note that in connection with the 124th Conference at Victoria, B. C., to be held from August 12th to 16th under the auspices of the Dominion Educational Association, special train arrangements have been made by the Canadian National Railways. There will be a special train to the Pacific Coast, leaving Toronto at 1.00 p. m. on July 26th, and numerous optional trips may be taken for the return journey.

The special train will be one of the finest of all steel equipment, with most modern type of compartment-observation cars, Library, Buffet Car, Standard Sleepers and diners. Nothing will be lacking in the way of entertainment. There will be a radio set in the Observation Car and a phonograph will be placed in the diner, this car to be used for concerts, or dancing if so desired.

From all Maritime Provinces points to Toronto, the regular train service of the Canadian National Railways is of the finest. It might be noted that the special train will stop at Jasper Park from Thursday, July 31st to Sunday, August 3rd, and the educational party will thus have three days in that delightful playground of the Rockies. The cars will be used for sleeping accommodations, while meals will be had at the famous Jasper Park Lodge.

A FEW OBSERVATIONS "Undoubtedly Maritime Co-operation may be made to serve the general good in many important ways without any reference to Federal or Provincial legislation."

"A general survey of the whole Maritime situation is urgently required. "How to hold what people we have; how to repatriate our sons and daughters; how to induce others to assist us in building up the Maritimes; agriculturally, industrially and commercially; how to improve conditions for our farmers, manufacturers and merchants; and less pessimism and how to bring about more optimism solve our Maritime transportation and marketing difficulties, are some of the problems the Maritime Development Association working in co-operation with existing agencies, governmental and otherwise, will endeavor to solve."

"It is obvious that we will never get anywhere by sitting down and groching about conditions in the Maritime Provinces."

"I am proposed to organize a "Maritime Provinces Club" at Ottawa, to function during the period the Senate and House of Commons are in session, the idea being to have monthly luncheons of Maritime representatives (Senators and Members) at which Parliamentary representatives and others from all sections of Canada will be invited to attend as guests of

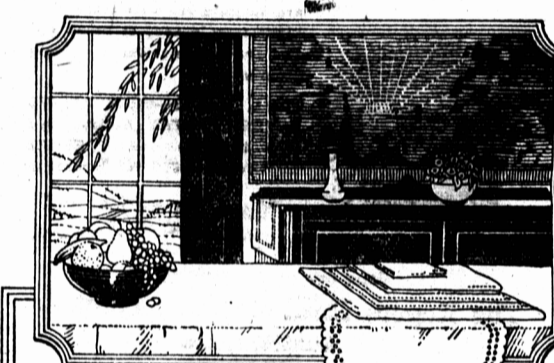
