THE DAIRY COW.—Reports are
frequently heard of large records of
milk and butter fat made by dairy
cows in other parts of Canada, but
as many such are for very short
periods and made under hot house
conditions by expert feeders, they
do not prove the real worth of the
dairy cow as accurately as the of
ficial record does which extends
over the entire year, especially
when such period is conducted on
the dairy farm under circumstan
ces identical to those on the ma
jority of farms in this Province.
To show that an ambitious young
man may obtain and develop a
very high producing herd of dairy
cattle, one might instance the rec
ords made by Mr. Howard Call
beck, of Tryon with that good help
er "Cornelia Hooker Posch," fresh
ening at the early age of two years
and one month. "Cornelia" gave Mr.
Callbeck in slightly over ten
months, 13,588 lbs. milk averaging
3.88 per cent fat, 527 lbs butter
fat, which at 69c a lb. the average
price paid by Crapaud Creamery
for that year, was worth \$363.63. Mr.
Callbeck bought "Cornelia" at her
dams side from W. M. Lea, and he
deserves great credit for devel
oping her to make such a splendid
record at the age for any breed of
twenty-five months, which is the
highest record for the age made in
the Maritime Provinces. Mr. Call
beck also made a year's official
record of 14,820 lbs milk, 590 lbs
butter with the dam of this heifer
when three years old, and on a
small farm with a total of five cows
and heifers made one thousand dol
lars in milk at the creamery the
past year. There is a splendid pro
fit in feeding dairy cows of this
calibre.

JOHN K. McLEOD

In the early morning hours of
Monday January 3rd Mr. John K.
McLeod a very highly esteemed
citizen of Springton passed peace
fully away at the ripe age of 83
years.

The deceased had been in com
paratively good health until a
little more than a week before his
death when he was taken ill with
a heavy cold which later develop
ed into pneumonia. All that medi
cal skill and kind friends could do
was done but all to no avail; the
remaining strength over four

ed above; Mrs. Murdoch McLean;
and a little daughter called Flo
rence who died when very young.
His second wife was Miss Mary
McLennan who survives him.
In the second family there was
only the one son Chalmers.

Mr. McLeod was very widely
and favorably known and will be
much missed not only in his own
home where his presence was ever
a benediction but also in the church
and in the whole community. For
a large number of years he was
an elder in the Presbyterian
Church at Hartsville; and was or
ganized faithful in the discharge
of the duties of that sacred office.
In taking up the work of this office
he followed in the footsteps of his
father who for many years had
been an elder also.

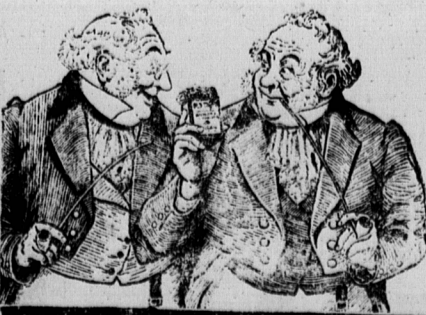
