were killed and wounded in fighting at Malkiya, a mile inside the new Hebrew state at the Lebanese border.

A special Hagana bulletin said the besieged Arab city of Acre on the northern coast "is expected to surrender at any moment."

Hagana said an armored British column en route from Hebron to Rafah on the Egyptian border "was attacked yesterday by machine gun fire from Egyptian planes."

Hagana reported that a British officer got in touch with his base and asked instructions. He was told to take no action but to ask for fresh instructions in event of a new attack.

(In London, British officials said they had received no report of an attack on British soldiers in Palestine.)

Invasions Underway

CAIRO, May 16 (AP) — The invasion armies of five Arab states hammered away with air and artillery attacks today at outlying Jewish settlements in Palestine, dispatches from Arab capitals said.

A Damascus dispatch said a kindred Syrian and Lebanese striking force was moving "into the northern coastal area from the Lebanese frontier."

The Syrian Government decreed newspaper and press dispatch censorship and refused to accredit either local or foreign newspapermen to the Syrian army.

In Amman, capital of Trans-Jordan, an Arab source said heavy artillery of the Iraq army reached the Upper Jordan Valley and infantry crossed the Jordan at Jist al Majami.

TRAINING HOSPITALS

LONDON — (OP) — Fifty of Britain's hospitals are to be set aside for teaching purposes under the National Health Act. Each hospital will provide special facilities for training and research for medical and dental students.

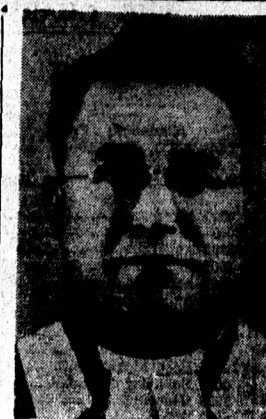

Scouting Receives Warm Praise From Cardinal McGuigan

TORONTO, May 15 — His Eminence J.C. Cardinal McGuigan, Archbishop of Toronto, commends the Boy Scout Movement in a special message released today, reading as follows:

"The Catholic Church throughout the world has made use of the Boy Scout Movement which is providentially adapted to the needs of boys today.

"Some of the great saints of the Church like Thomas More in England and Isaac Jogues in Canada, have been held up as perfect examples of the Scout Law and Promise. As the present Pope, Pius XII has said: 'Scouting gives to the worship and service of God the pre-eminent place that it ought to have in human life.'

"I rejoice on the Fortieth Anniversary of the Boy Scouts Association, and I pray God to bless and increase its beneficent work."

Revises Mailing Date For Pension Increases

OTTAWA, May 14 (CP) — Retroactive increases in pension checks dating back to last Oct. 1 will not be mailed out in early June as previously announced but should be in the hands of pensioners by the end of June, Veterans Minister Gregg announced today.

About 200,000 cheques and 400,000 pensioners or their dependents are involved.

No Prosecutions In Margarine Case

OTTAWA, May 16 (CP) — The celebrated case of the smuggled margarine will result in no prosecutions, a Revenue Department official said Saturday.

Reason: The evidence has been contained.

The four pounds of margarine they brought across the border from the United States as a mark has been eaten by Senator Norman Paterson (Ontario) and three other members of the Ottawa Board of Trade.

So, the official said, there would be no evidence for prosecution under the tariff item which bans the butter substitute.

Largely Attended Funeral In Edmonton

The following details of the funeral of the late Hon. W. A. Fallow, well known in Prince Edward Island, appeared in a recent issue of the Edmonton, Alberta, Bulletin:

"Hundreds of Albertans attended funeral services at Robertson United Church or lined the streets of Edmonton to pay their last tribute to the late Hon. W. A. Fallow, minister of public works, this afternoon.

"They saw his remains in a grey 'special state casket' with silver fittings in the church, or on its way to the Edmonton cemetery and most of them remembered him affectionately as 'Bill' Fallow.

"The church was filled with priority in the seating going to government dignitaries and officials with whom he had contact since his election and his appointment to the Cabinet in 1935.

"MLAs from the government side of the Legislature were nearly all present.

"Front seats in the centre of the church were reserved for mourners, with the rest of the church available to civil servants and the public.

"Primer Ernest Manning gave the sermon and based his remarks on unity in the spiritual and the physical fields.

"Service opened with the reading of the 23rd psalm 'The Lord is My Shepherd.' This was followed by the hymn 'Dear Lord and Father of Mankind.'

"The 121st psalm preceded the reading of the scriptures taken from the book of Proverbs and from the 14th chapter of the book of John in the New Testament.

"Mr. Manning's address was followed by a prayer by Rev. Angus McQueen, pastor of Robertson church.

"Service concluded with the hymn 'O God Our Help in Ages Past,' a hymn which was selected by the late Hon. William Aberhart as the Social Credit election hymn in 1936.

"Mrs. A. J. Lauder, organist played 'O Rest in the Lord' as a prelude to the service and Handel's 'Largo' was the postlude.

"More than 500 floral tributes banked the front of the church and were on display at the graveside in the Edmonton cemetery where interment took place.

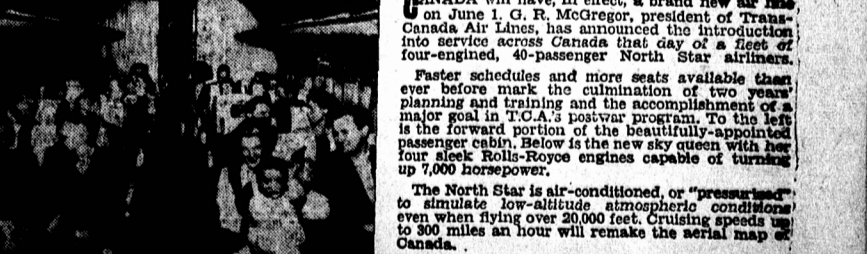

New Fleet Takes Skies on June 1



CANADA will have, in effect, a brand new air line on June 1. G. R. McGregor, president of Trans-Canada Air Lines, has announced the introduction into service across Canada that day of a fleet of four-engine, 40-passenger North Star airliners. Faster schedules and more seats available than ever before mark the culmination of two years' planning and training and the accomplishment of a major goal in T.C.A.'s postwar program. To the left is the forward portion of the beautifully-appointed passenger cabin. Below is the new sky queen with her four sleek Rolls-Royce engines capable of turning up 7,000 horsepower. The North Star is air-conditioned, or "pressurized" to simulate low-altitude atmospheric conditions even when flying over 20,000 feet. Cruising speeds up to 300 miles an hour will remake the aerial map of Canada.
