WAR NOTES

British Wounded Display Much Cheer.

More trainloads of wounded officers and men from the front, via Southampton, arrived at Waterloo Station yesterday.

Their wounds and torn and blood-stained uniforms brought the war vividly home to the thousands of people who assembled to witness their arrival, but the chief note of the men was not one of pathos, but of un-faltering cheerfulness.

The utmost smoothness characterized the arrangements for their reception. Officers suffering only from slight injuries were first assisted to alight from the train and placed in motor cars, taxicabs and private omnibuses.

One officer with a wounded jaw still managed to keep his pipe between his teeth while another brought out later on a stretcher, was smoking a cigarette and eagerly reading a newspaper.

Conditions in Antwerp as Reported in Amsterdam.

The Allgemeein Handelsblad of Amsterdam published the following description of present-day conditions in Antwerp, as given in a letter from that city, which is now in the Belgian capital.

"The depressed atmosphere in which we are living here is almost unbearable. We have the feeling here as though we were forsaken by all the world; nothing in the way of news penetrates into the city.

"Everyone is nervous and excited. Whenever anyone appears with a bundle of papers, he is assailed by a crowd, hungry for the latest news. There is always a huge crowd about the central railroad station, awaiting the arrival of trains from the direction of Brussels with fugitives who may have late news from the seat of war.

"I saw a train of German prisoners. Although they were apparently tired and somewhat listless, they looked well in their neutral-toned uniforms. Many of them had wedding rings on their fingers. They rolled cigarettes in a nonchalant way and seemed to be indifferent to what was going on about them.

Automobiles employed by military officials, Red Cross employees, scouts, etc., have the right of way, and they rush through the crowded streets at a fearfully dangerous rate.

I should hate to count the victims that have already fallen prey to them. But then, human life is cheap today. The newspapers don't even trouble to report the numerous accidents. It is dangerous for any citizen to protest, for this would reflect on his patriotism and cause his arrest on the suspicion of being a spy.

"In the outskirts of the city everything is full of soldiers. Soldiers and civic guards examine the credentials of every person arriving at the gates, and everyone who cannot prove previous residence in Antwerp is harshly turned back.

Everything has been prepared about every cannon on the walls; all the moats are filled with water. Trees and shrubbery have been chopped down, in order to allow the artillery free play.

Barbed wire has been put up in all directions. Beautiful oaks and beeches have been sawed down and dropped across the roadways to delay an advancing army.

Every suburban village is quartered full of soldiers. I saw a train of German prisoners. Although they were apparently tired and somewhat listless, they looked well in their neutral-toned uniforms.

HOLLANDER TELLS HOW GERMAN SANK BRITISH TRAWLER.

A Hollander who has arrived in Amsterdam tells an interesting story of how the British steam-trawler, on which he was, with fifteen other trawlers, was sunk by the Germans.

He is married to an English woman, and has lived for thirty-two years at Grimsby, from which place and from Boston the trawlers set out on their fishing expeditions.

A fortnight later 160 men, possessing nothing besides the clothes on their backs, were walking through Wilhelmshaven, "It must," he said, "have been 400 miles northwest of Wilhelmshaven that we one fine morning saw two trawlers of our fleet hailed by the German torpedo boat Albatross."

My man at first wanted to run for it, but the German turned his guns on us, too, and demanded to know where we came from. In the evening we heard three gun shots; that must have been for the Omreiter and the Vaillant

LATEST RUSSIAN STEEL ARROWS FROM ALOFT.

BERLIN, Sept. 22.—The German eastern army continues its operations in the district about Suwalki, Russian Poland, according to a statement issued by the general staff.

The army is now advancing on the fortress at Osorewo, 45 kilometres (about 30 miles) south-west of Lyck (Eastern Prussia), on the railroad between Lyck and Bielsk (a town on the borders of Lithuania and Poland). This fortress guards the river Bobar, which elsewhere cannot be crossed, owing to swamps, and forms a natural barrier before the advancing army.

The German headquarters still give no definite information regarding the position of the battle line in France, contenting themselves with speaking of it generally as located between the Oise and Meuse rivers, but not mentioning what part of this large region the Germans occupy.

Famous Sculptor Killed.

Lieutenant Werner Von Baellou, one of the best known German aviators, has been killed. He was mortally wounded while reconnoitering a hostile position on September 4, but clung to the steering gear until he and his observer had safely landed within the German lines. He then collapsed.

The twenty-eighth casualty list just published shows 1,036 dead, 4,039 wounded and 1,029 missing. The total losses as given by all the lists in now 7,483 dead, 28,584 wounded and 9,900 missing.

The list just published seems to include the casualties from the recent battle at Tannenberg, East Prussia.

Most Modern Terror of War.

A shower of steel arrows, released by French aviators over a mile high in the air, is the most modern terror of war, according to accounts of German wounded, printed in the Munich medical weekly.

The arrows, which are of pressed steel, from four to six inches long and a quarter of an inch in diameter, have a heavy pointed head and a skeletonised shaft.

The arrows seem to have caused more surprise than actual damage. Only one man was killed by a head wound in the attack described, the others causing mostly flesh wounds.

The regiment to which the wounded belong, resting in close battalion formation, paid little attention to two aviators flying a mile overhead until the novel projectiles suddenly rained down, scattering far and wide. Men were wounded in three companies. The battery in the rear, at first non-plussed, later realised the source of the missiles and as many as possible crawled under the wagons and escaped another shower of them.

Crown Prince, George and Prince Frederick Christian of Saxony have been awarded the Iron cross.

VICTIMS OF THE KOENIGSBERG.

LONDON, Sept. 21.—Lieut. Commander Richard C. Turner, Lieut. John H. Drake, twenty-four men of the British cruiser Pegasus, were killed in action with the German cruiser Koenigsberg. Three officers and fifty men were missing.
