The annual district meeting of Crapaud District Lodge was held in Prince Arthur Lodge Room at Crapaud on Tuesday, the 16th inst., over forty members from different lodges in the district were present. The officers were elected and installed for the ensuing year after which the district Master Ranger McNeil of Crapaud Lodge, Argyle Shore, supplied a supper for the brethren which was served at the home of Bro. Thomas A. Cobb. After justice was done to the good things provided toasts were given and responded to. Bro. John McKay from East Bedford, was present and made a speech and an enjoyable time was spent. At the close a vote of thanks was tendered to Mr. and Mrs. Cobb for their hospitality, and the company disbanded after touching the host and singing "For He's a Jolly good fellow."

The mild weather of the past month or so and especially the open harbor, which, up to a few days ago, was free from ice except around the wharves and the shores, has reminded citizens of conditions which prevailed nineteen years ago. Up to the middle of January in 1892 the harbor here was perfectly free of ice, as were Alberton, Summerside and other P. E. Island harbors. The prevailing weather was fog and rain and roads were in a muddy condition. Farmers in Crapaud were plowing and ice men here were expressing grave fears for their chances of getting in a supply of ice for the summer trade. The Northumberland and the Stanley were both running between Picton and this port and on the 13th Taylor and Lord, of St. Peter's Island came to this city in an open boat. The Southport was running to Rocky Pt and up East River and on that evening a heavy rain fell. In this harbor on Monday 11th, a single scull boat race was held between A. Newsome and C. J. Paton and on Wednesday, (13th) two four-oared crews fought it out in a race under good weather conditions. The winning crew were John Young, A. Wedge, S. Wedge and W. Perry. There were other races also on that day. A Guardian of that date stated that "there is no sign of snow as yet and several more races may be looked for before the harbor closes." Among the citizens who remembers the last mentioned race distinctly is Chief of the Fire Department Ronahan, who first called The Guardian's attention to the mild weather of that year.
