Health Insurance

make grants to provinces for health insurance and other health measures; a draft provincial bill, containing the machinery under which insurance and a physical fitness bill, authorizing creation of a federal fund from which grants would be made to provinces carrying on approved programs.

The Minister said it would require at least two years to get the entire population organized but there was special need for a fitness program now and this was embodied in a separate draft bill to permit of an earlier start.

The unification of these measures in one system and the filling in of gaps with health insurance, contributory old age pensions and other measures along the lines suggested in the Beveridge and Marsh reports required study of constitutional problems and provincial agreement. Mr. Mackenzie said it would be best, for the time being, to fill in some of the gaps and the biggest gap was in the field of health insurance. Starting the proposals contained in the draft bill Mr. Mackenzie said:

"The advisory committee recommended that the Dominion Government be empowered to assist financially any province which enacts a health insurance measure. The Dominion Government will be required to pay once a year.

The basis of payment is worked out by dividing the estimated cost of sickness in Canada as fixed by a bureau of statistics study in 1935 at \$240,500,000 and adjusted for 1938, by the number of persons more than 16 years of age. That comes to \$26.68 per capita and hence the figure of \$28.

The bill provides, however, that no person is required to pay more than three per cent of his income on his own account and so employed persons receiving less than \$800 per year will pay three per cent of their incomes while the remainder of the \$28 will be collected from their employers.

Assessed contributors will pay only three per cent if their income is under \$800 and the public treas-
