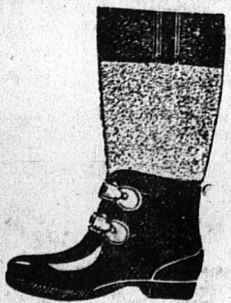

Dear sister.—Just a few lines to you today as it will reach you before Xmas. I am well and hope that this will find you all in good health.

You ask me about bread in your last letter, the best comes from the following address. You will have to write there, sending money and my parcel address, and they will forward the bread weekly, the address is given at last of letter.

I suppose the weather there will be getting cold ere this. I had a letter from Blanche a few days ago. They are all well at time of writing. I don't suppose you will hear from me now for a while after this, as I have to write to several other people. Of course our writing is limited, as you know. There is not much that I can write, but like to get word from home as often as you can find time to write.

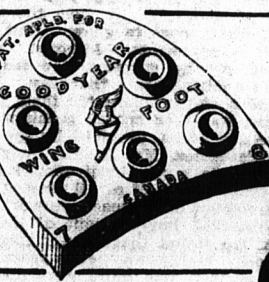
Miss McKenzie replied in fitting terms and a few remarks having been made by some of those present, the company broke up, after singing the National Anthem.
