The Souris Board of Trade held an enthusiastic meeting on Monday night to consider the winter train service. J. J. Hughes, M. P. and John McLan, M. L. A. presented the demands of the East, for a daily express both ways and a freight every other day. Superintendent Sharp discussed the arrangement of last winter. The difficulty has been that the winter train which was mixed did not make good enough time. He did not think an additional train east would increase business either way. He mentioned the running of the Souris train between Mount Stewart and Charlottetown as an express. This would give fifteen minutes more in the morning and allow the train to depart half an hour later in the afternoon. This might be done daily and on Tuesday and Friday the freight from Souris to Mount Stewart be shipped. This arrangement however would hardly satisfy the meeting and the superintendent said he would lay the matter before the General Manager and do nothing in opposition to the demands of Souris.

THERE passed peacefully away at Stanhope on the 14th inst after a few weeks illness Duncan MacLaughlan. He was a man that will long be remembered for his kind and cheerful disposition. He was one of Stanhope's oldest and respected residents.
