OFFICIAL visit.—Last evening Victoria Division of the Sons of Temperance received an official visit from the Grand Worthy Patriarch John A. Lawson Esq. After the usual official reception the Grand Worthy Patriarch addressed the division on the state of order within his jurisdiction, referred briefly to the recent meeting of the National Division in the City, and closed his addresses by congratulating the friends of temperance, and all concerned in the success of the Prohibitory Liquor Law in Charlottetown. The law is being more and more respected and it is the desire of every good law abiding citizen, that it shall be enforced the same as all other laws on the Statute Book. The law is the result of many long years work on the part of the Christian Church and temperance advocates, and it is now high time that the law stand firm and refuse to listen to anything in the shape of compromise by the enemy. The address of the G. W. P. was followed by a musical selection from two lady members, and short addresses by several of the members after which the meeting closed in Love, Purity and Fidelity. Miss M. O. Campbell, P. G. W. Associate of New London, who has spent the last two years in Buffalo, was present and favored the division with a short account of the rainbow city. The meeting of the Division was one of unusual interest and was greatly enjoyed by all present.

AFRICA'S SPLENDID MEN.  
London Chronicle: Something really picturesque was seen in Pall Mall yesterday, when a body of black troops, in brown holland uniforms, marched superbly by. London could see for itself, what it has often heard, that Africa supplied a splendid set of fighting men for service against the Ashantis. MORGAN BUYS MORE STEAMERS.  
London, August 22.—Glasgow is intensely excited by the report that the City line of steamers, which is one of the oldest shipping concerns in the west of Scotland, has been purchased by the Ellerman City Line, which is well known in the East India trade and numbers fourteen vessels, with an aggregate measurement of about 40,000 tons.

COLOGNE, August 22.—The Gazette which usually speaks semi-officially, denies the report that Emperor William has been appealed to settle the dispute between France and Turkey over the uquays at Constantinople. The Gazette also says there is no truth in the report that Crown Prince Frederick William is to marry a foreign princess.
