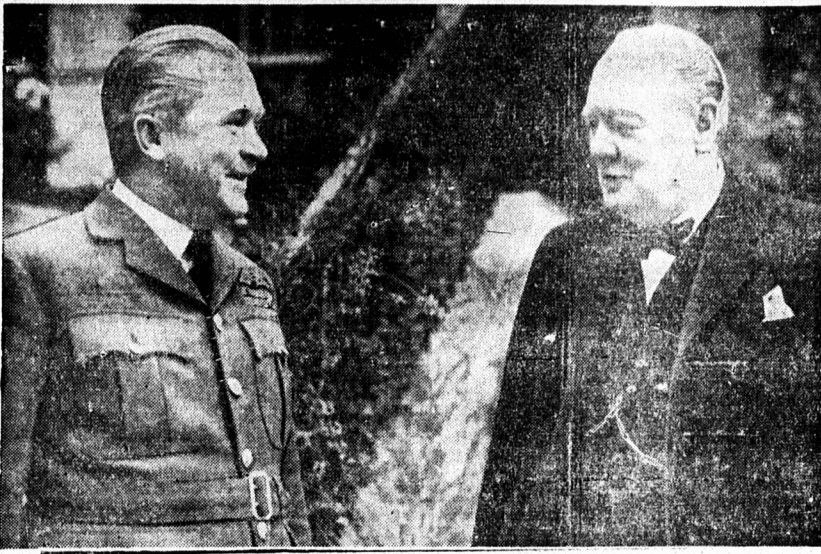

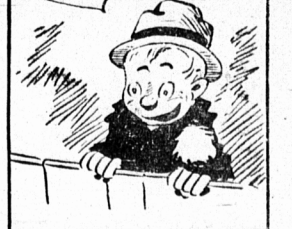
Manufacturers Urge Action On Report
