MYSTERIOUS FIRE IN NORWAY PORT

Goods Ready for Shipment to England Destroyed by Explosion.

NO REPUBLICANISM FOR SOUTH AFRICA

CAPE TOWN, South Africa.—Indication of the growing disfavor with which the Pretzorgie Republic agitators throughout the country are regarded, is afforded by the action of a large and representative meeting which took place today at Bredasdorf, a typical Dutch country district. The meeting resolved unanimously against the Republican propaganda. Speakers expressed gratitude for the protection of the British flag under which as a principal speaker put it, "We are Republic for as freedom is concerned in everything save the name."

TWO YOUNG MEN WERE DROWNED IN THE MIRAMICHI

NEWCASTLE. When four young men, Andrew and Walter McEwen and Burton Snare, of Ferryville, and Abram Petrie, of Lower Neguac, who worked with Messrs. McEwen, were returning in a small boat from Chatham to Ferryville Sunday night the boat swamped in squall and Snare and Petrie were drowned. One of the others swam ashore and the second clung to the boat and was rescued. The bodies of Snare and Petrie have not yet been found.

SIR H. PLUNKETT IRISH DELEGATE

DUBLIN.—Sir Horace Plunkett, a prominent Irish agriculturist, has accepted the invitation of the Government to act at the coming Irish convention as a delegate of their nomination.

Sir Horace Plunkett has long been a leader of agricultural societies in Ireland. Politically, he has extended his efforts towards settling the Irish Home Rule question by attempting to persuade the Unionists not to desert the other Irish parties. In May he expressed the opinion that the Government's proposal of a convention for the settlement of the Irish problem would be accepted by Irishmen and has advocated that plan since. Sir Horace should not be confused with Count Plunkett, who is a Sinn Feiner and who was recently released from prison in Dublin after he had been arrested at a Sinn Fein meeting. Previously, Count Plunkett had taken part in a Sinn Fein meeting which rejected the Government's plan for a convention on the Home Rule question.

NO INCREASE IN THE MAXIMUM PRICE OF COAL

(Canadian Press Despatch.) HALIFAX, N. S.—The conference here between the coal operators of the Nova Scotia and G. A. Magrath, Dominion fuel controller, having associated with him Joseph G. S. Hudson, of the Mines Department, Ottawa, Hon. R. G. Beesley, representing the Nova Scotia Government, and James H. Frink, of St. John, representing New Brunswick in the executive council chamber at the provincial building, was concluded on Saturday. The whole situation affecting the coal output, tonnage and prices, was exhaustively discussed. The general results of the conference are that the operators have obligated themselves to supply their regular customers in the Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland and have undertaken that there shall be no increase in the maximum price of coal at the mines, which ranges from \$4.50 to \$5.00. With reference to the hard coal situation the fuel controller announced his intention to further investigate the matter with a view to affording relief if possible. The normal freight relief and the uncertainty of water transportation are said to be the chief causes of the present high prices.

LESS BREAD EATEN IN GREAT BRITAIN

LONDON.—Premier Lloyd George has written to the chairman of the National War Savings Committee, thanking him for the committee's efforts in effecting national food economy. Mr. Lloyd George adds that he has "every hope that the people of Great Britain will be able to claim that they accomplished of their own free will what the people of other countries could only achieve by compulsion." What the committee has done may be illustrated by the figures relating to the reduction in the consumption of bread. Thus in the Paddington district of London the consumption of bread dropped by 25 to 30 per cent. in two months. In Wiltshire bread sales for the week ending the 12th of May amounted to 481,829 pounds, whereas in the week ending the 2nd of June they amounted to 380,404 pounds. Brighton is eating 20 per cent. less bread, and Reading 25 per cent. less.

Pertmouth reports that 180,540 pounds less of bread were sold during the last week of May as compared with the last week of April, and a further reduction of 78,840 pounds was achieved in June. Chef tenham's consumption was between 20 and 30 per cent. below the average for March. Cirencester, Bridge-wary, Westbury, and many other places in the provinces show reductions varying from 20 to 35 per cent. These are only some figures chosen at random from reports collected by the committee, but they show the thoroughness of the work it has done.

VENIZELOS HAS TROUBLE WITH THE NEW GREEK KING.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) PARIS.—The following despatch was received by The Temps from Athens: Serious differences seem to have arisen between the new King of Greece and Premier Venizelos. One indication of this is the postponement by the King of the signing of a decree to resubmit the 1915 chamber of deputies which was illegally dissolved by the then Premier Stephanos Skoufodis.

M. Venizelos demands that the King cease to carry out his father's internal and external policies, but the King is postponing action or has refused to give his approval to such categorical repudiations.
