A HORSE ran away yesterday afternoon on Kent Street and created quite a commotion. He struck a girl that would place him with the fastest class on record. Near King Square the robes and other contents of the sleigh were thrown out, and the horse kept on his way with unbroken speed.

The funeral took place on Tuesday last at Sydney C. B. of Montague Irving Mills from the residence of his mother, Mrs. W. H. Andrews, 223 Bank Street. Deceased was the son of Havelock Mills, and grandson of the late W. T. Mills, of Clearmont, Prince Edward Island. Deceased was a bright promising boy. Seven months ago he took an attack of grip which developed into consumption. All that loving care could do was done, but of no avail.

On the 7th inst. at Ottawa, Lady Davies entertained for her younger daughter, Miss Mary Davies, and her guest, Miss Waverline Steele, of Toronto. Lady Davies received in the library, gowned very handsomely in a black accordion pleated chiffon robe trimmed with lace and medals of cut steel. Miss Gertrude Davies wore white crepe de chine with garnitures of rib lace and pearl ornaments. Miss Mary Davies wore pink blue nylon de sole, with bouquet of pale and white sweet peas.

The death took place at the P. E. I. land Hospital, yesterday morning about 9 o'clock, after an illness of six weeks, of Albert Hart, Halifax, age 65 years. Mr. Hart had been on the island all summer visiting his daughter Mrs. Harry Newson, Rocky Point. The funeral took place from the residence of John Newson, Eustace Street, last evening. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. William Dobson. A large number of the Masonic Fraternity of which deceased was a member, were present. The pallbearers were: The Worshipful Masters of the two city lodges, Percy Barlow, W. Harry Wate; Past Masters F. H. Beer, St. John's Lodge and Ewen Stewart, St. George's Lodge; Past Grand Master Adam Murray, Past Master John W. White, representing Grand Master. The cortege accompanied the body to the Railway station. Mrs. Hart who has been on the island for some time, accompanied the body to Halifax.

At the Supreme Court which resumed its sittings on Monday the cases of The King vs. Mrs. Elizabeth McIntyre, and The King vs. James P. Wm. Power and James King, have been tried. In the former case the prisoner was charged with the larceny of a ruff from the store of Moore & McLeod, Charlottetown. The case occupied all day on Monday, a spirited defence being maintained by the prisoner's counsel on the plea of mistaken identity. Witnesses swore that Mrs. McIntyre was not in the store at the time charged, and several persons, as well as a policeman testified to the fact that another woman looked so like the prisoner that they could not tell one from the other. The case was given to the jury in the evening who remained out four hours and returned with a verdict of Not Guilty. Weeks for the King; A. J. B. Mellish for the defendant. Yesterday the Court tried the second case, the charge against Power and King being assault upon an Indian in the house of Mrs. Annie Coyle, in Charlottetown. After the evidence was all in the jury were charged by the Chief Justice, and returned with a verdict of Guilty. Attorney-General for the King; Matheson, K. G., Morrison, McKinnon, and Duffy for the prisoners. The Court is now listening to evidence in the King vs. James Power, Edward Hennessey, John King and Francis Power. The prisoners are charged with assaulting Policemen Taylor and Klugtas.
